ency with the occurrences in the present Indian social and religious state of affairs. Are we really so blind to see that the ones being killed are none other than the citizen of our own country? Magazines, newspapers, televisions, and all the other media are fraught with images of the horrific carnage caused by the riots and its aftermath. This is not the India that Lord Rama (for whose

birthplace the whole mayhem stemmed) would have envisioned. Moreover 'God', today has become more of a verb than a noun. When will they stop politicizing religion? 'They' are of course the people 'up there'. Some days back I read an article in the Times of India on the Indian black market. It depicted clearly how our political and administrative institutions

THE SUMMER SCHEDULE

The words 'public schools' have their origin in Britain and represent the real essence of 'public schools', because these schools do not discrimate in admission based on caste, creed, colour, or race.

The primary aim of a public school is to expose the child to a general all-round education so that he emerges as a good secular citizen of the country. Besides, the public schools work towards

developing the minds of the children, along with their physique, skills, personality and leadership traits. The flowering of both the teacher and the taught is very important. Otherwise education becomes a mere mechanical process oriented to a career or some kind of a profession. The school schedule contributes a



The schedule acts like a guide and stimulates everyone with directions planned and set forth in a well-coordinated manner.

The new summer schedule introduced in our school in early April, is dynamic and well-conceived though it has come in for a lot of flak especially from the habitual disgruntled lot. Starting the day with PT is something beneficial for the physical well being, as it charges the body and gears gives it to meet the challenges of the day.

The PT period has been increased by ten minutes and there is a perpetual 'grumble and rumble' from the those late for the first school that there is not enough time for a quick shower before rushing for the first school, as if to say there were never any late-comers before this schedule came into force!

A significant change in the new schedule, is dispensing with the five minutes breaks between

schools. Earlier, when classrooms had been allotted for different subjects, the five-minutes gap was needed for the boys to move, or rather 'saunter' from one room to another. Now that it is the teacher alone who moves according to the schedule, the fiveminute breaks are irrelevant. Dispensing with these small breaks, has permitted the addition of a seventh school to the daily schedule. This in turn hashelped to finish with



the 7th and 8th afternoon/evening schools held on Mondays and Tuesdays, there by helping to keep the afternoons free for other activities. Once again there is an urge amongst us to mope around that the new schedule is very 'cumbersome and hectic'. This protest is unwarranted, as only two more schools have been added to the earlier schedule.

I am sure there many others who wonder at the concept of 'free schools' which is native to Welham! This concept puts to shame even the most casual college and university routines! The so-called 'free schools' sees many a boy lounging oridling around doing absolutely nothing constructive or beneficial. A casual glance in the LRC brings to mind the scene of a transit lounge in an interna-

tional airport with boys sprawled in all postures!! A polite reminder to the 'shirkers' to utilize this time reading useful materials or completing unfinished preponly falls on deafears. Thus the very aim of the LRC (Learning Resource Centre) is defeated.

It is a fact that reducing the time interval for break fast, assembly and fruit break has helped to add buoyancy and life to the steps of many of the boys who otherwise would often dawdle around casually.

Boys now have the facility of an hour post lunch rest period followed by an hour of self-study in the hostels. This extra 'prep' hour was very essential since many a day boys miss 'prep' because of an interhouse or interschool activity in the evening. This 'bonus' hour of prep in the early evening ensures that those who really have the inclination to work will utilize it. Hence, no one can 'crib' that 'prep' was not done due to a lack of time. The new schedule has brought in an additional 'prep' hour on Mondays and Thursdays besides the two hours twenty minutes of 'prep' time after supper. This has provided ample flexibility in the schedule for those seeking extra coaching for competitive examination for classes XI and XII, and also those wishing to pursue any sport or games practice sessions. It is earnestly hoped these extended 'prep' hours will give an opportunity to those with an academic bent to scale greater heights of achievement on the academic front and thus help Welham to rid itself of the image outside of being not a school but 'a holiday resort', as reported by our very own boys seeking admission into Delhi schools after class X!

With ample time during the day to pursue academics, boys will no longer need to burn the midnight oil. Hence 'lights out' at 10:30 PM, if strictly adhered to, will definitely give boys a minimum of seven hours of sleep-most essential to relax and prepare themselves mentally and physically to meet the strenuous and rigorous challenges of the new day.

Games and various sports seem to have

evinced a great interest (never seen before) in the boys, as can be witnessed from the serious practices going on all day long, on the fields under experienced coaches hired by the school. The desire to excel in sports has surfaced probably because of the proposed fee concession to those excelling at different levels. What ever be the impetus behindthis zeal, one should bear in mind 'a healthy body houses a healthy mind'. The channeling of the exuberant spirit of youth along positive and productive channels will surely help to curb some of the prevalent ills in the campus.

A very interesting observation during the evening is the presence of seniors 'hanging around' the games field waiting impatiently for the juniors to wind up their session, in order to gain access to the field. Their enthusiasm and zest is commendable. But where is this zeal and zest when reporting for classes. When they can stand and wait long before their turn comes, why do they keep teachers waiting for them in the classes? They seriously need to maintain a balance between academics and extra curricular activities. Just as they slog and labour to acquire the skills of their favourite games, I am sure if they were to devote even half as much of their time and energy on the academic front, we would have many a proud 'topper' from our school.

I end this piece on a contemplative note. Most of us surely remember reading the extract on how Tom Sawyer got his fence white washed by his peers, who came to ridicule and mock, but stayed on to paint it for him!! If only we execute work assigned to us with joy and delight, the task will no longer appear to be irksome and odious. Instead it would be delightful and pleasing. So if we cease 'cribbing and moaning' about the 'shady and lousy' new schedule turning the school into what boys believe to be a 'military camp', we will be working towards the vision of the school - of turning out well balanced and disciplined citizens of posterity.

There is more disorder now compared to the previous schedule. Since there is no time given to relax after every school, boys make lousy excuses and manage to get away from the classroom.
