A Peep Into the World of Magic and Magicians

"Magic happens in the mind of the beholder" – goes the adage. Magic is the most ancient and the most universal of arts.

Ancient, because since the prehistoric times, humans have been known to use "Magick" (with a k) in attempts to gain control over the powers of nature.

Universal, because the same feats that mystify a rustic villager in the remotest of the jungles of *Jharkhand*, also mystify the President of an American blue chip company in San Francisco, California. In this age of Information Technology, when the world cup matches can be seen live, thousands of kilometers away, on cell-phones, audiences are still bewitched and baffled by the feats of necromancy that bewitched and baffled their ancestors many generations ago.

Mention of Magic and description of the amazing feats of Magicians is found in the history, literature and folklore of every country of the world. Magicians were ministers and advisers to Kings through the ages. The oldest written record of court Magicians was painted circa 2500 BC on the wall of a burial chamber in *Beni Hassan* in Egypt. The Westcar Papyrus brought out from the pyramids by Egyptologists carry fabulous stories of the wizards of the Nile.

In India, the hymns of Atharva Veda, are said to be the source of Magic and Magical powers. In the early seventeenth century, Emperor Jahangir, in his memoir, "Jahangirnama", described a visit by a troupe of Bengali Magicians to his courts who performed unbelievably amazing feats of Magic.

Harry Houdini (USA), PC Sorcar and Gogia Pasha (India) are among the pillars of modern Magic. Among the most famous Magicians of the present times are Paul Daniel (UK), Doug Henning (Canadian who settled in US, passed away last year), David Copperfield (US).

Jean-Eugène Robert-Houdin, the French Magician of mid nineteenth century. is today recognized as the "Father of Modern Magic". He was an expert watchmaker. His entry in the show biz began when he created clockwork driven life size puppets or automatons that enacted amusing scenes all by themselves. In 1845 he opened his famous "Soirées Fantastiques" in Paris. He created modern stage illusions and devised entertaining presentations. He was the first to write textbooks that treated Magic scientifically. His memoirs were described as the best among the ones written during those times. In 1856, Robert-Houdin was appointed the governor of Algeria, then a French colony. The tribals of Algeria were almost on the verge of rebelling. Robert-Houdin was able to convince that his French Magic was more powerful than that of the natives. Thus the incipient rebellion was quelled.

A German Jew. Ehrich Weiss, was inspired by the achievements of Robert-Houdin, he added an "i" to Houdin and took the pseudonym Harry Houdini. Harry Houdini later moved over to USA and became a legend in escapology, a branch of Magic where the performer can not be held under any physical Houdini could free himself from police handcuffs, shackles and leg-irons used in any country. He could unlock any lock without any key or tools. He challenged and successfully escaped from high security prisons all over America and Europe. The name of this legendary person became a common noun beginning with a capital H and can be found in the Concise Oxford Dictionary:

Houdini /hu: 'dimi/ n. 1 an ingenious escape. 2 a person skilled at escaping. [H. Houdini, professional name of E. Weiss, American escapologist d. 1926]

From India, the names of Praful

Chandra Sorcar and Gogia Pasha, are known all over the world. Sorcar specialized in Indian Magic and Indianized presentation of Western Magic. His spectacular stage shows, are now being carried on by his son, Pradeep (PC Sorcar Jr.)

Pasha took the Magic of Indian street performers. Added colour, humour and his wit to it. He refined it to suit the taste of the Western audience and travelled around the world as a very successful night club performer. There are many legends and anecdotes about him. According to one, he was once performing at a café in Berlin of Hitler's Germany. It was illegal to carry British currency in Germany during those days. Pasha was in the middle of his famous act "The Miser's Dream". He was making coins and currency notes of different countries in all denominations appear out of thin air while moving around in the café. Suddenly Hitler himself walked in. Pasha reached near Hitler and pulled out British currency from the dictator's pockets. Hitler was amused and impressed. He awarded a medallion to Pasha for this interesting presentation. After retiring, Pasha settled down in his hometown, Dehradun, where he later passed away in 1976

Magic is the ultimate stage of any skill. When something is practiced adequately, enough, it starts appearing like Magic. We literally come across expressions like "Com-

puter Wizard", "The Magical Voice of Lata Mangeshkar". When India was the World Champion in Hockey, Major Dhyan Chand was known as "Hockey ka Jadugar", When he played, the ball appeared to have stuck to his hockey stick. Such was his control that several times the opponent teams suspected that his hockey stick was gimmicked and got it changed, but this did not hamper his performance in any way. There are Magicians of sorts in every field, be it simple domestic chores or intricate artwork.

We Magicians, use our talent to create a world of fantasy. We attempt to challenge minds, stimulate imagination and break the monotony of the routine life. Mystery is the essence of our Magic. We guard our secrets not because of jealousy, but to maintain this mystery. Thereby ensuring pleasure for our imminent audience as well as for the audiences in future.

If it is so secret, how could one learn it? Well the answer is through mentoring? It is not that we do not pass on the secrets to the new generation. If this were the case, this art would have become extinct long ago. We are always on the lookout for talented and hardworking members of the younger generation, who have the potential of taking up Magic as an art activity.
