

MUSIC REVIEW

Artist: Slipknot

Album: All Hope is Gone

Genre: Heavy Metal

Release Date: 26 October, 2009



Before the album was released, Slipknot vocalist Corey Taylor said in an interview, "It's going to rip your face off." "I don't think the world is ready for this album." I can confidently say, he's right. This is by far their best album to date, and easily their most brutal one. They are beginning to differentiate themselves from the rest of the "Death Metal" breed.

One thing that seems to turn metal-heads off Slipknot is their lack of blast beats, constant double bass drum machine gun guitar solos and riffs. Well guess what? They are here. Slipknot show off their technical skill and mettle in this album far more than ever with their new guitarist Jim Root, who used to play for their own side project Stone Sour. The best part is that, despite adding new techniques in this album and adding more "musical" elements the overall quality of music hasn't changed.

The song writing hasn't changed at all from their previous albums. The lyrics have become slightly more mature; they are still dealing with very similar issues as in previous albums but now phrased in a more global and aware manner. Apart from the new additions to their guitar

solos and slightly changed drum work the "Slipknot type" music hasn't changed, and this album, overall, sounds pretty decent. From song to song the mood swings quite dramatically. Ranging from brutal and angry to optimistic, it is far more open than anything Slipknot has ever done in their career.

Some of my favorite songs and the songs I feel you should listen to are "Dead Memories", "Vendetta" and "Sulfur". These songs have the perfect amount of "metal" and are songs which you can call the next generation of heavy metal as these have guitaring with clean distortions and drums with extended double bass which makes it a total new breed of heavy metal.

All in all, I really enjoyed the album, specially as I am a big fan of Slipknot and felt that they would do well with more machine-gun solos and better drumming. The album is not spectacular. It's good but not great. Any Slipknot fan should really love it and Slipknot is more likely to gain more fans out of this.


MOVIEREVIEW






WELHAM NOW

The Chief Guest for the ceremony was Brigadier Ranbir Brar. Oli presents you excerpts from an interview with him.

Oli: We have with us this evening Brigadier Ranbir Brar, who has had a long and distinguished career in the Indian army. Sir, it is indeed an honour to have you here.



Brigadier: Thank you; I am privileged to be at Welham.

Oli: Since you are here for the Investiture Ceremony and you yourself have been a leader, what qualities do you think a leader should essentially have?

Brigadier: Well....being a leader in my capacity is one thing but as a Prefect it is another, Let me talk about the leadership qualities that you people must have. First and foremost is your school. Your total dedication, your loyalty and keeping the dignity and the honour of the school, is your primary concern. Secondly, when I say "school" I do not mean the buildings and the play fields- I mean the Principal, staff, your standard, the teachers, everything and the ethos of the school.

So if you have compassion and consideration, and the qualities I have mentioned, then you will make a very good prefectorial body and good leaders in life.

Oli: Sir, you yourself have been to some of the best residential and public schools in the country. Which school or college do you have the fond memories of and why?

Brigadier: Yes, I am very fortunate. You always have fond memories of the school you finished off from. Ours was one of the last batches to do Senior Cambridge. Bishop Cotton was the school I finally moulted and passed out from. And I have fond memories of the school. I was telling some boys that once your school life is behind you, for 20 to 30 years you are busy with your life but later, at a certain age you look back and think of your school. That is when you acknowledge where you started from and know that it was your school which prepared you for all those years you did well in life

Oli: Sir, how have the skills that you imbibed in the army helped you in your corporate career?

Brigadier: Everything I have learned in the army has helped me in my corporate career. In fact, the corporate world has imbibed a number of qualities from the army. The jargon is different but all the principles have been in the defence services for over 200 years. Today, all the

practices of management have been picked up from the army. In addition, I think that the biggest common factor is that you have to deal with human beings. Now, in the army, we are not only dealing with human beings but we are dealing with lives, so your perspective on dealing with humans is a little different from anywhere else. I think this is a very good asset for the country and the corporate world too.

Oli: Sir, you have participated in the INDO-PAK war of 1978, which was a huge victory for our country. What are the memories that flash across your mind when you think of that year?

Brigadier: We had recently been commissioned into the army with only two months of service when we went for that war. When I look back now, I think it was one big "fair". Its only when you come back home that you realize that war is no good. The worst thing that any commander has to do is to face the family of a soldier who lost his life fighting for the country. That is a very painful thing.

Oli: Sir, how did it feel to be commissioned into, and then go on to command the same regiment which your father once commanded?

Brigadier: Yes, I think it was one of the most proud moments of my life, to sit in the same office as my father. I was the 24th commanding officer of the battalion. My father was the 12th. Our battalion was raised in 1941 during the Great War and I believe that even the third generation of officers has joined the battalion. However, till date I have been the only second generation commanding officer who commanded the same regiment as his father

Oli: What was the name of your battalion, sir?

Brigadier: Now it is known as the Eighth Mechanized Infantry. In my father`s time it was the 7th Punjab Regiment.

Oli: Getting a little political here, what would be your take on the Sukhna Land Scam?

Brigadier: Since you are asking that

direct question, there is no scam. What do you understand by a scam? You assume that some government agency has taken money or has handled money in an inappropriate manner. However, it was not army land which had been transferred. It was the land which belonged to the government. The only thing that needs to be done before starting construction near a sensitive army area is to get a "no objection certificate" from the army authorities. Now, it is for that authority to decide whether something goes against national security or not.

Oli: Does it become subjective then?

Brigadier: It could be subjective. The man who has to face a court martial was not even there. The only thing he possibly did was to speak to the gentleman and if I could use the word, make a 'sifarish.' The person who has actually signed the NOC is more responsible. It is not a scam.

Oli: Being a neighbour of the school, what do you like or dislike about this school?

Brigadier: Well, I dislike nothing except that you have very high walls. I think school is doing very well I have been here for various occasions and have positive feelings.

Oli: To wrap the interview up, what would you like to say to the Welhamites and to the youngsters of the country?

Brigadier: I will leave it to the country, but I alone would definitely like to give a piece of advice to the Welhamites. You people are very fortunate to be in such a good institution. Don't waste your resources, don't waste your parents' money and make full use of this opportunity. The school has so much for you. You can learn many things, don't waste time. Do good things as I said, think good and do good. That is the advice.

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

Interview with Mr. J. Loftin

Oli: Sir, Do you think educational institutions should be single sex or co educational?

Mr. Loftin: I run a coeducational school and I enjoy it. I see merits in both the systems. But as the headmaster of a coeducational boarding school; I am very pleased with how we are able to develop respect for the other gender in this young lot. The environment is very friendly. It is actually very similar to a small global community.

Oli: Sir, since the students coming to your school are from both well off families and not so well off families, there must be certain racial intolerance towards students at the beginning, so how do you deal with these problems?

Mr. Loftin: I've never seen such a phobia toward students because of their socioeconomic status; the phobia has come at times in our school history with regard to bringing students from different nationalities together, but that has long passed. Now the students are very comfortable. I think the biggest transitions are for the students who are coming into the school to be comfortable around different groups of people.

Oli: Is this your first visit to India, Sir?

Mr. Loftin: Yes, it is.

Oli: How long have you been here?

Mr. Loftin: About a week.

Oli: Which all schools have you visited so far?

Mr. Loftin: Well, I have visited Welham, I have visited Woodstock and I visited a village school outside the Dehradun area. I just wanted to see what the village schools were like.

Oli: How was your experience with Welhamites?

Mr. Loftin: Welham has been the most impressive school, I have visited in India. The students here are very courteous and they seem very eager to learn. The teachers are doing a beautiful job, nurturing the students and bringing out the student's potential and duties as an individual. You have a very healthy learning environment

Division of States

Since independence, the question of 'Division' has always been trouble for our policy makers. After the death by fasting of the Congress MP Potti Siramalu, PM Jawaharlal Nehru, appointed the States Reorganisation Commission in 1952, which submitted its report in 1955 and formed states on the basis of linguistic identity. The count was 14 then and today after 55 years is, it is 28.

The phrase 'Division of states' gives a picture of formation of two territories that are insular to each other's existence 'Division' is a term that talks of complete separation . But the rationale of division is not separating or building walls but ensuring contribution of even the remotest region to a bigger entity that is India. Therefore, the idea is not pro 'Division of states' but pro 'Reorganisation of states'. Reorganisation means the re-structuring of a system for better results, not only in terms of increasing monetary income but also strengthening ties. In the Indian context, reorganisation required is in terms of 'Size'. There are many reasons to support this argument.

The second question is of regional imbalance. Large states tend to overlook certain areas of the state in the allocation of resources. This is clearly visible in the case of Maharashtra where growth is seen only in the region of Mumbai-Pune industrial belt. Andhra Pradesh, is yet another example. During YSR's tenure, out of 59lakh hectares of land that the 26 irrigation projects were supposed to irrigate, 43 lakh hectares was around coastal Andra and only 16 lakh hectare around the desperate Telangana region. The 'logic' behind such allocations is that growth will spread to other regions. But as we can see very clearly that it hasn't happened because if it had, we would not have seen violent protests in Telangana. This problem does not arise in smaller states, simply because, the area is limited.

Many here would raise the question of the economic viability of a smaller state. Their question is well answered by the performance of our three youngest states, namely, Chattisgarh, Uttarakhand and Jharkhand. The growth in GSDP{Gross State Domestic Product } has been phenomenal. According to the 11th Plan Commission approved by the National Development Council, Chattisgarh, Jharkhand and Uttarakhand achieved a growth rate of 9.2%, 11.1% and 8.8% pa as against their target of 6.1%, 6.9% and 6.8% respectively. Bihar too, after being reorganised has turned out to be the second fastest growing state of the country. This has been possible, only because of the formation of small states. A smaller state with a not so large population allows direct contact to develop between the people and the administration. It is now easier for people to voice their opinion, seek redressal and avail of public resources, thereby bolstering progress. Such individualized attention aids the administrators in quick and efficient implementation of policies and in maintaining law and order. This establishes an organised and structured society whose progressive environment promotes economic growth, paving the path for economic development and hence leading to welfare, the ultimate aim of any country.

People today are looking for a change, a change for the better, 'Reorganisation' is the key to this change. The process has just started with a small green flag to Telangana, but we have miles to go.

The leaders backing statehood are highlighting the paucity of economic development and representation of ethnic minorities. Here are issues, which will remain unresolved even after sub-division of states. How is then a new Telangana, Vidarbha, Poorvanchal... going to make any difference to the lives of these ethnic minorities?

On top of this, the cost of establishing and maintaining the new temporary executives will further fillip the drain of wealth, considering the magnum Rs. 4 crore required just to maintain the office of a governor, per year. Imagine the resources needed to first establish and then maintain a totally new state legislature. Moreover, why do we need another set of systems and its manipulators? Creation of small states on the basis of administration 'may' be considered necessary for the sake of faster growth, smooth administration,



quicker execution of policy framed by the government and the monitoring of the plans and policy executed at the ground level. But what is the guarantee that small states will function properly and there will be all round development? There are still many states like Goa, Arunachal Pradesh, Sikkim, Mizoram, Jharkhand and Chattisgarh, where no sign of development is visible because the entire energy is lost in a change of government. What is the guarantee that 'leaders' like Madhu Koda will not play with government funds and become owners of property worth Rs. 4,000 crore in just 2 years of their regime? Water facilities are not yet available in the rural heartlands. Electricity is scantily distributed. Farmer suicides are rampant. Equity is just a utopian phenomenon. It stuns me to know that there are government funds amounting to Rs. 2,000-3,000 crore for the 'beautification' of parks, but nothing to improve the basic amenities of the poverty-stricken "aam aadmi".

As far as smooth functioning, monitoring of policies and real development is concerned, we already have a reliable set up in place called the district administration. Some hold the opinion that states like Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra and Bihar are too big to work efficiently. Given this assumption, even the Union should bifurcate. On the contrary, the entire nation is divided into districts, each encompassing a uniform population. To monitor 3-4 districts, there is the office of the commissioner and then comes the state administration. Similar structures are already built by our constitution makers and forefathers for the police department as also for judiciary, to ensure quality functioning. The grass-root policy implementation is carried out with the help of this bureaucratic machinery. Latches are in place, yet what this administrative doorway lacks is 'bolts'. Our systems have failed to a certain extent as they were short of supervisions and safeguards. Corruption is the single biggest challenge India faces today. Various welfare schemes like NREGA and RTE have reached the execution stages. Bills like the recent Women's Quota and Right to Food are gradually going through the

legislative phase. No matter how path breaking these projects appear to be on paper, results matter more than plans. For efficient execution of policies, efficient monitoring is of paramount importance. This story is not wound around political scams. The matter of concern here is much broader, much greater, it is about our 'rights'.

The road to a NEW DIVIDE leads to imposition of strikes, vandalism of office buildings, sabotaging of 'public' property, abandonment of government work, halting of economic activity and monetary damages running into millions of rupees. In the end, we are more divided. Whom are we holding to ransom, Our own nation? At this hour, what is needed is not a 10-day yatra, acclaiming new states (Telangana). India longs for assemblies of its people championing social audits, not transmogrifying an educational institution into a sight of burning effigies.

Pranab Mukherjee's affirmative "promise" has apparently turned the wager for pro-Telangana campaigners. Let us suppose, the movement accomplishes its goal and a separate state of Telangana is carved out of Andhra Pradesh, how is the government going to avoid further demands for statehood (as what happened in 1956). The aspirants of a dream Gorkhaland, Vidarbha, Mahakoshal... will intensify their strategies to further break up this union on ethnic lines. In 1956, the makers of independent India divided the country into states on linguistic lines. After 54 years of reorganisation, why are we corroding the fundamental principles of nation building. Instead of unifying as one people, why are we veiling the failure of state governments with the cloth of statehood? Mother India was cut into two in 1947 (partition) after being diagnosed with religious intolerance. She was later segmented on linguistic lines. Today her children are still in satiated with the pre-existing differences. Ethnic loyalty is being preferred over peaceful unity. The need of the hour for Indians is to be Indians first, Marathi, Telugu, Tamil... later.




