THE ANATOMY OF MISS WORLD

Millions of viewers are gripped by television's cliff hanger of the year - the Miss World Final. They always watch transfixed, as the beautiful girls parade at the Royal Albert Hall in national costumes and evening dress. Home experts in comparative anatomy denigrate each other's favourites by calling attention to a too-tilted nose, plumpness, a hint of weakness in the Achilles tendon. Not until the triumphant, damp eyed winner wears her wobbly crown, do the viewing millions relax.

Most Miss Worlds have completed their year's office and concentrated on a bright future.



DUDHWA: A Report

Dudhwa is a tourist's paradise situated in the dense jungles of the terai of Uttar Pradesh. It is on the Indo-Nepal border and in the district of Lakhimpur Kheri.

To reach Dudhwa you can either fly to Lucknow, the capital of Uttar Pradesh, and from there cover the remaining distance by taxi or bus. It is also possible to go by train by alighting at Shahjahanpur station and traveling the remaining eighty five kilometers by car, taxi or bus. Dudhwa can also be reached directly by train but then you have to walk four and a half kilometers through the forest to reach the forest rest house.

We went to Dudhwa by train till Shahjahanpur and from there covered the remaining distance by bus and also in jeeps.

There are four rest houses where you can

lodge. One is in Dudhwa and the others are in Sathiana, Sonaripur and Bankati. The rest houses at Sathiana, Sonaripur and Bankati are in the middle of the forest, and from here wild animals are often seen in the compound during the dark hours.

Rooms are available at rates ranging from rupees twenty five to rupees fifty and dormitories at rupees ten per night. Food is available at the rest houses at nominal rates. You can also lodge in the ethnic 'Tharu' huts which resemble those of the villagers living nearby.

As our group consisted of twelve boys and one escort, we lodged in a dormitory which accommodated all of us comfortably.

For the convenience of tourists, the National Park has made arrangements for elephant, van, pick-up trucks and jeep rides.

For an elephant ride the rates are rupees twenty five per person for a two and a half hour ride and rupees ten per head for an hour long ride for six students. For a ride in a jeep or a van the rate is rupees ten per head plus an entry fee of rupees fifteen per vehicle.

The National Park itself covers an area of four hundred and ninety square kilometers. This vast area is inhabited by a large variety of animals. The main attraction is the tiger and spotting one depends on how good your luck is.

The National Park contains approximately fifty percent of the world's swamp deel population (more commonly known as the 'barasingha'). Their number is fast dwindling and you can count yourself lucky if you manage to spot a herd. The park also contains other species of deer like the barking deer, spotted deer, chital and sambhar.

Rhinos has also been introduced into this National Park though they are kept behind an electrified fence, hidden from public view.

The Park also contains several leopards whose appearances, however are rare. The Park is also inhabited by a large number of peacocks, crocodiles, snakes, wild boars and jackals. It contains three hundred and seventy five different species of birds. The rarest bird which inhabits the Park is the Great Indian Bustard. The other birds include cranes, kingfishers and woodpeck-

ers.

The flora covering the vast area of the National Park ranges from the thickly spread elephant grass to the Dhak trees laden with bright orange flowers. One can see fascinating combinations of Sal trees and grasslands; grasslands and wetlands.

The best way to view a tiger or any other animal is riding on an elephant back as it is capable of reaching the dense and remote parts of the jungle. If you can sit on a 'machaan' at dawn or dusk it is easy to spot a large number of animals. The forest also consists of anthills, some almost six feet tall.

We went through the jungle in jeeps and on elephants. We were able to see a large variety of deer, mainly the spotted deer. The jeeps were made available to us by three former students of Mr. Painuli who were very generous to us throughout our stay. We were lucky to have spotted three tigers: two while travelling by jeep and one while riding an elephant.

The Park has been aided by valuable contributions made by Billy Arjun Singh who is a naturalist and tries to prevent injustice to animals. We met him at his residence 'Tiger Haven' where the showed us two documentaries; one on Dudhwa and the second on Tara, the tigress which he has brought up.

There are other places also which are worth a visit, like the 'Quila' where a battle is said to have been fought many years ago. There is also the grave of a saint and the grave of a Rajput king, and his wife is supposed to have committed 'Sati' there.

Dudhwa's peacefulness, tranquility and scenic beauty makes it a beautiful place to relax and enjoy the wildlife which till recently had been preserved well but alas, now shows signs of dwindling
