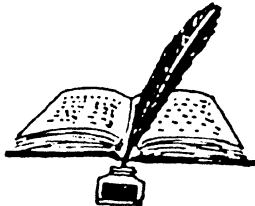

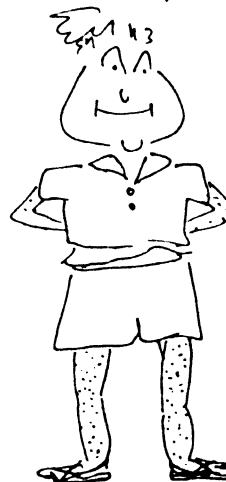
- The Welham basket ball team won the Golden Jubilee Inter School basket ball tournament defeating Guru Ram Das Academy hands down.

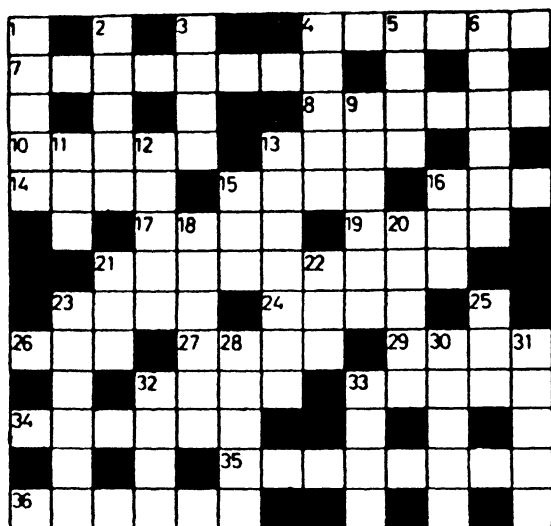

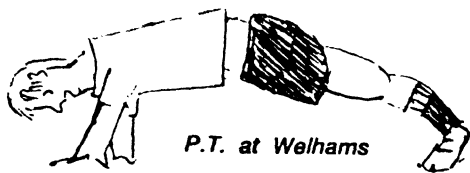
