
The paragraph is....

1) Minutes of the Meeting held on the 31* October 1999, Venue: L.R.C., Time: 12:30 Noon

The President Mr. Darshan Singh welcomed all members present to the AGM.

The House stood in silence to condole the passing away of Bawa Daljit Singh-1940 & Chaitanya Sud-ICSE 1999.

The President in his brief statement started by welcoming all the members who had come to attend the AGM from far & near & said that, "The Strength of today's attendance shows that the society is moving from strength to strength"

- 1. The President asked the House if there was any matter arising from the minutes of the meeting held on 1st November 1999 AGM & then confirmed the minutes, as no serious matter was pending to be discussed at this AGM.
- 2. The President in his Brief Report on the activities of the society during the year 1999 and in his tenure as President of the society for last 2 years stated that the Society had taken shape & a lot of ground had been covered in various spheres especially in building and upgrading the Data Base which is the life line of any society. This was achieved partly by organizing get-togethers of its members from time to time in various regions.

He Quoted "The purpose of any society is to support itself first then its members & when it is strong financially it should do something for the school and by getting together in various regions we have now started activating members by being in touch with them as our Data Base is becoming updated."

He emphasized that the compiling of the new directory (WOBS Register) was a Herculean task undertaken by Mr. Raju Verma in a short time with the help of the DataBase from both the Dehra Dun Secretariat as well as his records. "Well Done". This register will have a lot of mistakes but it is a starting step to a new one which hopefully in the next few years will be fully undated with all members addresses, telephone numbers, e-mail addresses etc. The last page of the directory has a form for change/correction of addresses to be mailed to the Secretary WOBS Dehra Dun. "It needn't be just your address but also of other members with whom you are in touch so that our next register shall have fewer errors."

Another major achievement was making of the Memorandum of Association of WOBS to finally register it as a society. ""We have also made guidelines for gentlemanly running of the society", he said. The President would hold the post for 2 years and then would not stand for re-election & the Vice-President who would have worked under the President for the last 2 years would automatically take over as President. He further stated that he would like to see people coming up the ladder-First as active member then as Regional Representative, further moving onto the Executive Committee & finally looking forward for becoming the Vice President & the President of the Society.

3. The Vice President Mr. Tanuj Sethi in his brief report told the house that he had learnt a lot under Mr. Darshan Singh-about how to function & work to strengthen the Society. He thanked him. He further went on to say that in his tenure as Vice-President he worked in close contact with the President & other Executive Committee members but his main work was concentrated in organizing and coordinating the working of Regional Representatives. From a few of them he got a good response but some of them didn't even bother to respond to his letters.

Mr. Darshan Singh said," It has been minuted in the last AGM point 6 b. made by Mr. S. Kandhari Suggesting that non active representatives should be voted out & more active ones to be appointed in place of them." So in the case of non active members we need to make certain changes as a non active regional representative can really bring a set back in activating his area.

He, with the help of the President had been also dealing with the proposal from Standard Chartered Bank & and other various banks to have Welham Boys' Affinity Card. As any progress is made on this field I shall inform all members regarding it.

4.In a brief report by the Regional Representative of Dehra Dun chapter Mr. Raju Verma reported that during the year this region had 3 successful gettogethers with Old Boys from nearby towns also attending them. He said members had decided in one of these get-togethers that they would hold two get-togethers in town & one in the campus during the year & the one held in campus would have teachers who have done 10 & more years as special invitees.

In a brief report by Mr. Nikhil Kriplani about the Delhi region, he said that due to personal reasons he had not been able to take active interest in the chapter but despite that they had a good gathering in September this year. He further stated that due to personal reasons he would like to step down as Delhi Representative.

The Indian Region Round Square Conference, 18th to 23rd January, 2000. The Indian School, Al Ghubra, Sultanate of Oman

The theme of the conference: "To rejoice in life, to find the world beautiful and delightful to live in, is the mark of our spirit which distinguishes it from all that has gone before."

The Round Square Conference, India Region was held at the Indian School Muscat, Oman from the 18th Jan to 22nd Jan 2000. The Welham Boys' Delegation comprised Mr. S.K.Kandhari, Mrs. Usha Kandhari, Mr. Oswald Das, Aatir Ansari, Abhishek Agarwal, Anant Golyan, Anubhav Mehta, Ashim Bhat, Fatehpal Singh, Pranay Patodia, Samarjit Singh, Sumit Gupta, Tarunjot Juneja.

The Chief Guest to the Conference was H.M.King Constantine accompanied by Mr.Terry Guest, Director Round Square and Mr Gulab Ramchandani, Round Square Representative India.

The first Kurt Hahn Lecture was given by Mr. & Mrs. Hanne and Jane Eriksen on' Wildlife in Oman with special emphasis on the bird life'.

Mr. & Mrs. Eriksen came to Oman in 1986 when Jens was appointed Associate Professor of Chemistry at the Sultan Qaboos University. They have since travelled extensively in their spare time all over the Sultanate in search of birds in their

natural habitat and photographed them. They have presented an exhaustive book to the Welham Boys' Library on their research.

On Wednesday 19th Jan the second Kurt Hahn lecture was given by Mr. Michael Cross on 'What is the purpose of Life?' This he explained with the help of a poem 'Fulity' by Wilfred Owen. He was a Flaming Scholar and a MA degree in Chemistry from Hertford College, Oxford. He has also been the Rector, St.Paul's School, Darjeeling and at present looking after the affair of the Varky Group of Schools in the UAE.

The Barasa (discussion Groups) met at 11.30 am and discussed and debated on the theme "To rejoice in life, to find the world beautiful and delightful to live in, is the mark of our spirit which distinguishes it from all that has gone before."

The groups were named after the historic towns of the 'Sultane and of the school houses. They were Ibri-Khasab, Muscat-Nizwa, Salalah-Seeb and Sohar-Sur. These speak for the diversity and history of this wonderful country and take us into every corner of Oman.

On 20th Jan Thursday we drove along the coastline to Sur an old town that once famous for shipbuilding. The drive offers a glimpse of the beautiful natural desert landscape of Oman. Re-

cently a Liquid Petroleum Gas Plant has been set up by a multinational company and will be a rich source of revenue to the country.

Sur is also famous for the wild life beach especially reserved for marine turtles that come ashore to lay their eggs. It was a great moment when we witnessed turtles come ashore and lay eggs and then return to sea only to return to the same spot years later. The Government is very sensitive in protecting the fragile environment in Oman and has invited noted research scholars in this endeavour.

On 21st Jan Friday we drove back from Sur and were invited to one of the governor's residence for lunch. In the afternoon we had the opportunity to visit the modern commercial centre existing in harmony with the traditional market places called

'Souq'. These Souqs are markets where fruits, vegetable, fish & meat and house hold utensils are sold. The Bedouins in the past generally came to these centres to trade or buy their daily needs. Saturday 22nd Jan was the final day of the Confer-

ence and there was plenty to do still. We were taken on a sea cruise to watch nature's most fascinating marine mammals - ' The Wild Dolphins' in their natural habitat feeding on schools of tuna fish.

The afternoon was spent preparing for the plenary session. The Valedictory function was at 6 PM and the Chief Guest was HH Sayyid Haitham Secretary General, Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The Conference was brought to a close by various thanks giving speeches and an entertainment programme by various schools. Farewell dinner and goodbye followed.

The Welham Boys' delegation stayed on for another three days and had the opportunity to visit the famous round tower Nizwa fort and the Souq famous for ornamental silver jewellery and intricately hand carved daggers. The students also got the opportunity to visit various local towns in around Muscat and buy gifts for their loved ones

The delegation returned safely to Delhi on the 26th January.

RSIS-OKHIMATH

The three of us, Mehul Khati, Divya Agarwal and Himanshu Gupta went for RSIS Project which was held in Okhimath, about 40 kms from Dehra Dun. There were various schools from different regions of the world. The eminent schools amongst them included Southport from Australia, Lakefield from Canada, Scindia School from Gwalior, St. Lawrence School from Sanawar, Doon School, Vivek High from Chandigarh and ourselves.

After equipping ourselves with all the requirements for the camp, we left for our destination on 9th December, 1999, from Doon School by bus. Enroute, there was an accident which blocked our path so we were accommodated in a rest house near by to spend the night.

The next day, we reached Okhimath and put up our tents. Nestling in nature's lap, Okhimath was a landscape of aesthetic beauty with lots of greenery in the vicinity. Mr. Stephen Erdley, our project in charge accustomed us to the work which had to be done in the village. Our task was to build a community centre in the village and to repair a near by school which was destroyed by the earthquake.

Our work mainly consisted of transporting building stones and bricks to the construction sites. Our whole team was divided into five groups of about ten students each, headed by an escort. We formed chains and thereby transported the bricks. The task was rather tedious as we had to work in continuity for hours at the same place. Some of us also joined in carpentary work, some opted for masonry, and some students switched over to stone-

breaking etc. We even had some skilled people to help us construct the building. In addition to that, we had to transport several bags of sand from the top to the site of construction. It was exhilirating task since the villagers joined our hands and made the work easier. Talking with the village-boys and other people revealed to us, the grim reality of life.

There were several cultural and entertainment programmes put up by the villagers and the RSIS team in the evening for recreational purposes. Everyone actively participated in the programmes. We also had group discussions with the villagers, staff and amongst ourselves to create a sound understanding and encourage interaction.

We developed harmonious relations and shared our views with each other. Interacting with people from diverse regions and culture was a stupendous experience. The time went on so fast that we never realised that we had constructed a big community centre of bricks and cement, and that too, with our own hands. It was really worth having a look at, and we all could feel the cord of joy strike inside us. We returned to school on the 21st of December. On the whole, the RSIS project was a project which will always be cherished in our memories. It gave us an opportunity to enhance our skills, interact with different people from the world, adapt to our surroundings, and above all to work as a team to help the needy. It is surely an unforgettable experience.
