
EDITORIAL

Born in 1906 at Patiala, Shri Dharma Vira received education at Lucknow and Allahabad University and at the London school of economics and political science.

He was the Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Administrative Staff College of India. He was connected with many leading ministers as advisor, chairman or director and closely associated with many social and philanthropic associations. He was the Chairman of our Board of Trustees for nearly two decades and on his retirement was appointed as the Chairman-Emeritus.

Exchange from Australia...

They say that a student exchange is an experience of a lifetime and experience that will change your life forever. On a student exchange you will meet lots of new people, make lots of friends, learn new lifestyle, new cultures, a different outlook on life.

I come from a small town in the center of Australia. It is quite remote and is very different to Dehradun. It is in the Simpson Desert. There the weather is extreme; it goes above 40 degrees in the summer and drops below 0 degrees in winters. Also, being in a desert it does not rain very often because of that everything is dry and the soil is red orange. Alice Springs has a large river running through the middle of it, it hardly ever has any water in it. Many gum trees grow in and along side the river. This river also flows through the Mc Donald's ranges, which are located right next to Alice Springs. Also only a few hours drive away is Ayevs Rock.

The school I attend there is St Phillips College. It is somewhat smaller than Welham, but it only accommodates for classes 7 to 12 and

of around 500 students only about 50 board, the rest being day students. The school week in Australia goes on Monday to Friday. School starts 8:20am and there are 7 classes of 45 minutes each, and then finishes at 3:00pm. Some of the main sports played in our school are Football(the Australian version with a pointy red ball), Rugby, Cricket, Soccer, Basketball and Netball. The school is co-educational school and does not have any physical punishment.

Before I came to India, I just thought it was a large country, overcrowded with people and that they have very spicy meals. About a bit over a month before I left I was taken to the doctor to be immunised for my big trip. I was quite nervous about all these needles. I had to have many needles. I had to have a needle for tetnus, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis A and Typhoid. Now after having to have all these injections I was starting to get a little worried! I was beginning to think that India was going to be real dangerous and quite life threatening!

But now, after being here for a month I

have a whole new image of India. Now India to me is a busy country with heaps and heaps of people, very busy and quite bumpy roads, with wild animals wandering around and horns sounding every few seconds. The food was not quite as spicy as I thought it would be, and I can nearly have some meal without having any water! At first I found it very difficult to understand the Indian accent, but now I am quite used to it.

Being in such an amazing country, gives me a great feeling, experiencing what seems like a whole new world, so greatly different of what I am used to. Its truly a lifetime experience.


