- 3) Meeting of the L.R.C Council held on 8th March 2001 at the Cottage.
 - Minutes of the previous meeting were discussed and confirmed:
 - The Chairman said that the minutes of the meeting should be published in the Oliphant.
 - The Chairman agreed that the photocopier was easily accessible. The students should take interest in making their own notes. He inquired why the generator could not take on the load of the photocopier and asked Mr.Bakshi to look into this aspect.
 - The Chairman agreed that more personalities like Bill Aitken, Nayantara Saigal, Ruskin Bond should be invited to address the students, but the students should be aware of the books written by them and their interaction with the authors was a must.
 - The Chairman suggested that we invite Mr. Anil Karanjai and other local artists to exhibit their works in the gallery and give a talk to the students. Besides this Graphic Arts and Graphic Works by some of our old students could be displayed.
 - The Chairman said that behaviour in the library could only be implemented with the co-operation of the students and the staff. Rohan stressed that there was lack of interest in using the library as not much work was set where research or library books were required. •
 - It was suggested that the L.R.C Council go through the book catalogues and order books for the center.
 - The Chairman asked for inputs from the Council for the various angels/places where blinds would be required.

The following were suggested to make the use of the resources more effective:

- Photocopying timings would be fixed. The Chairman suggested the purchase of a simpler photocopier, which could be accessible to the boys.
- · Music system in the Audio-Visual room to be repaired immediately.
- To enhance reading habits among students, books reviews will be published in the Oliphant and the best reviews could be awarded a prize.
- The cover of the mattresses need to be redone.
- It was suggested that students of the sofa sets need to be repaired and upholstered.
 The Chairman said that these would be repaired but the upholstery would not be replaced.
 - It was suggested that the books found damaged should be submitted at the counter and they should be bound regularly. The Chairman agreed to this.
- The Chairman suggested that a chart be made on the computer on the steps to search a book and locate them on the shelves.
 - It was suggested that the L.R.C should be open till 6:00 PM The Chairman recommended that we conduct a Gallup Poll and the students can vote and the timings can be planned accordingly.
 - It was suggested that the vacant space in the L.R.C reference section could be used as a green house, with more plants. The Chairman said that he would ask the Estate Supervisor to look into the suggestion.
 - The students suggested that purchases could be made directly from Delhi as there was lot of variety, options and heavy dis count during fairs. The Chairman agreed.
 - Mr. Bakshi informed that Scholastic India will put up a book fair for two days some times inmid April.
 - It was suggested that other publishers could also be invited. The Chairman agreed.

 It was suggested that students should go for plays organized by local theaters. The Chairman instructed the librarian to check the calendar with Mr. Sameer Upadhyay

and arrange accordingly.

The Chairman recommended the purchase of all volumes of Feluda by Satyajit Ray for

the center.

The meeting ended with thanks to the Chair.

NATURE'S DIARY.

Clipping the wings of wild-bird trade

Saved from cages – and possibly death – wild red Lored parrots from Mexico were confiscated recently by federal agents at a Brownsville-Texas flea market. The agents arrested the smugglers who were selling birds including yellowheaded Amazons, for 125\$ each. Every year more than 1 lakh wild birds – mostly parrots – are brought across the border into the U.S.

Globally the problem is staggering. Between 5 million and 20 million birds a year are plucked from their natural habitats to supply the worldpet trade, draining native populations. About halfamillionenter the U.S. lawfully buthundreds of thousands or more are imported illegally. At least half of these captives die in transit cruelly stuffed into hubcaps, spare tires and even stockings. New York and New Jersey have outlawed the sale of

imported wild birds. More pet stores are selling captive-bred birds instead of wild ones. All cargo airlines refuse to carry wild bird cargo. Action has served as a catalyst for other protection efforts.

Aiming doubled barreled optics at feathered quarry, birders on a tour from the U.S. visit Virgin forests in the Yucatan Peninsula offering prized sightings of such species as the collared redlored Amazon parrot which are only found in Mexico. Early Europeans settlers stripped the island of sandal wood trees. During this period the red-lored Amazon parrots almost became extinct due to poaching and encroachment of natural habitat. If this mal practice of trading birds is not put to an end our world might soon lose these feathered creations of God.
