MR. O. P. MALHOTRA

- Q. 1 May we know something about your past life and education?
- Ans. I did my M. A. in 1943 from Lahore University
 After that, from 1943 to 1951, I was Head of
 Mathematics Department, D. A. V. Degree
 College, Hoshiarpur in Punjab. In 1951, I came
 to Doon School. In 1960 I was sent to England
 by the British Council. In England I taught
 Mathematics in various Public Schools. I then
 retired from The Doon School on 1st July, 1984
 After puting in 33 years of service in The Doon
 School and 8 years in the College, on the whole
 I have 41 years experience.
- Q. 2 What are your hobbies and other interests besides teaching?
- Ans. My hobbies are writing articles for the leading newspapers in India, like The Times of India, The Statesman, The Hindustan Times and The Illustrated Weekly. One article on The Doon School was published in The Illustrated London News on 9th April, 1960. Another hobby of mine is photography. Some of the photographs

He Visited Antartica

An interview with Dr. Madanlal

- Q. 1 Could you tell us something about your early education?
- Ans. Since a very young age I had love for mountains. I spent a greater part of my life in Jammu and Kashmir. I completed my education in Ladakh where I recieved my P. hd. Degree. I would visit the mountains very frequently from Simla.
- Q. 2 Why were you selected for this expedition?
- Ans. I had done my P. hd. in Ladakh under cold conditions. I was accostomed to extremely cold conditions and I had a very good heath, my contributions to mountaneering were many. These were a few of the many reason for my selection.
- Q. 3 What was your first impression when you saw Antartica.
- Ans. Early people like Scott who had visited Antartica gave us an impression that it was 'an awupil place'. Scoff called it 'the home blizards'. I being a tough minded optimistic, was really thrilled. In Bhagwat Geeta, Lord Krishna has said, "Raise yourself because self in self is everything". I only had a minor fear, wheather I would reach home alive or not.
- Q. 4 Did you have any difficulty or problems on Antartica?
- Ans. Physological problems always crop up. Like-Cabin Fever- a person does not like to stay in his cabin for long. Under extreme temperature and Six months night (in Winters), one likes to leave everything and run away. Then we heve

- O. 5 How much is the maximum expenditure for an expedition like this?

Any scientific information or anything newfound by any individual country must be disclosed to the other countries, (who have their base on Antartica). They even have to tell the types of machines they have, the capacity of their generators and so on If they are found killing any animal, they have to give a reason for it.
- Q. 8 How did your family react to this?
- Ans. Well, they were a major contribution to my success. As they say, Behind every successful man there is a woman in my case it was my wife and my family.

सतलज नदी के तट पर स्थित ग्रानन्दपुर साहब सिक्खों का पिवत्र तीर्थ है। जहाँ गुरु गोविन्द सिंह ने सन् १६६६ में वैशामी के ग्रवसर पर पांच प्यारों से खालसा पंथ का श्री गर्गोश किया था। यही पर १६-१७ ग्रक्टूबर, १६७३ को ग्रकाली दल ने वड़े उग्र रूप में कुछ माँगों को प्रकट किया था।

ग्रकाली नेताग्रों ने कुछ धार्मिक माँगे भी रखी हैं, जैसे ग्रमृतसर को पिवत्र धर्मनगरी घोषित करना ग्रौर सिगरेट, तम्बाकू माँस की बिक्री एवं सेवन पर प्रतिबन्ध, स्वर्ण मन्दिर से रेडिया पर गुन्वाग्णी का प्रसारम् और ऐसे देश के सभी ऐतिहासिक गुरुद्वारों का प्रबन्ध एक ग्रिविल भारतीय गुरुद्वारा कानून द्वारा शिरोमिण गुरुद्वार। प्रबंधक कमेटी को मौंपा जाना।

में पुलिस को गोलियाँ चलानी पड़ी।

पंजाब में कितने ही प्रमुख पुलिस ग्रधिकारियों की हत्या की जा चुकी है। रेलों में भी बहुत हत्या हो चुकी हैं। ६-७ जून '६४' को स्थल सेना ने स्वर्ण मंदिर तथा उसके बाहरी इलाक़ों को घेर लिया। बहुत गोलियां चली। जवानों तथा सेना के ग्रधिकारियों ने बहुत चेष्टा की थी कि स्वर्ण मंदिर को कम से कम नुकसान होया जाये। ग्राखिर में कई ग्रकाली पकड़े गये, कई भाग गये, एवं कई मर गये।

स्वर्ण मन्दिर की जब अन्दर से जाँच हुई तो बहुत गोला बारूद निकला। मन्दिर के नीचे एक तहसाना बना हुआ था। सरोवर से कई ट्रांसमीटर तथा बहुत कीमती सामान मिला।
