#### **GLOBAL GLIMPSES**

Satelite to be Launched for Minerals Search: The Indian satellite to be launched in the current fiscal year will become a premier search instrument for minerals by remote sensing as part of a national programme of Aeromagnetic survey.

India Regrets Jaywardene's Statement: India has expressed its regrets that S.i Lankan president Mr. J R. Jaywardene should have made the unfortunate statement to his parliament that his country should take steps to push forward its international border towards India.

And the war goes on: "Every punch will be answered with a harder punch", said Iranian president IKhomeni. The Iraqi city of Basra was badly shelled and was in danger of falling into Iranian hands. However, the Iraqis halted the Iranian drive and under the circumstances there appears to be no end to the war in sight.

Mysterious Moves: The much awaited arms talks in Geneva began in March with much small talk in public. As to what was discussed behind closed doors not much was known. 
The vicar watched this performance for a few minutes, then picked up the microphone.



The advantage of being clever is that its easy to play the fool. The opposite is more difficult.


#### **INVISIBILITY**

#### THE STATE OF SCHOOL AFFAIRS: PART II

It is always to sit on a desk and criticise as that is the easiest and natural thing which an ordinary human can do. Our first issue, though as fair and honest as we could make it, may have been in the view of some, the result of the same phenomenon. I must admit that during the course of my investigation I was pleasantly surprised to see that things are not as bad as one imagines them to be. Always, when one looks more dispassionately and objectively at issues of importance one is always surprised to learn that things and matters also have their brighter, better and more efficiently organized sides. This is true in the case of Welhams too.

The last session of the school committee proved beyond doubt that Welhams was gearing up or a perfect take off. Replying to various questions Mr. Kandhari said that the administration would look into various issues and take adequate measures to erradicate the flaws which existed in its functioning. He also repeatedly stressed the fact that the management was ready to refurnish the Art class if it was ready to define the type and amount of furniture it requires to furnish its immediate requirements. The members also discussed a few other minor issues towards which the management showed positive signs. However, Mr. Kandhari rejected the proposal of the committee in providing Jamuna House with 'Blinds'. This he did so while keeping the budget in view, as he claimed that the management was running low on the budget. Previously Mrs. Sinha (Matron of Jamuna Hose) had demanded that this issue be discussed in the committee meeting. However the 'management' rejected several minor issues such as 'Greasy plates' and 'provision of certificates to the winners of Inter-House Swimming competition'. However the administration assured the members of the committee that matters would be pryed into and that the administration would do everything within its reach find a solution to the problems. The administration also extended its support to the approval of the committee in providing a fence around the emblem of the school. This it did to preserve the emblem.

The management, recently gave a green signal for

the revival of Quiz. This it did in reply to some of the staff members' comments which hinted towards the fact that the general knowledge standard of the boys was of a rather poor nature. The basic initiative behind the revival of Quiz also included the fact of the elimination of films. The administration feels that apart from being less time consuming such programmes prove to be more interesting and educational. This was also followed by the revival of English Elocution after a span of two years. The English Department is also looking forward to stage the Inter-School Elocution competition successfully. school is also marching ahead with its ambitious E.V.S. programme. The authorities feel that this programme would enhance the boys' general knowhow' and it would enable them to utilise the libra.y more often and more efficiently. In a move to revive the English Department's efforts to boost the general english standard of the boys, the administration has agreed to the provision of a 'library period' for each every week.

The flow of books into the library recently gained momentum. The bulk of these include encyclopedias. Mr. Kandhari is personally directing this venture and the management recently invited various publishers. It was generally assumed that this was done to place an immediate order for various new types of encyclopedias and some other books. However, I would like to point out that that the 'National Geographic' has ceased to come in the library. The disgrantled atitude of some of the staff and boys demanded an immediate explanation to this the library claimed that this was due to delay in mail. Recently, the library also turned demands of the boys of the 'Time down the Magazine' The library department felt that the magazine was expensive and as it mostly dealt with politics, it would not make interesting reading for all.

In a move to improve the laboratories, the management recently had the whole 'diainage system' of the chemistry laboratory reconstructed. The new drainage system is of a much better design and provides more facilities. The management has also shown positive signs and has given its word that the school

would give shape to the science department for Class XII from next year onwards. Mr. Mahendroo (Head of science Department) feels that this is one of the greatest thing which the school may hope to achieve. He also added that the administration was doing much to refurnish the laboratories as it was rapidly replacing the old outdated instruments with modern equipment. Strong rumours have also circulated, which indicate towards a major spectacle—a Geography Laboratory which would include sophisticated equipment such as "satellite tracking radar system, weatherwane" etc. However the possibility of shaping this idea is still being discussed.

To remove the 'starvation of Cultural Activities', the administration in a major move arranged for various variety entertainment programmes. Apart from arranging a visit to 'Doon School' to witness the concert of the famous American Guitarist-Jaes Wilson, the administration also arranged for a trip to rhe Convent of Jesus and Mary and Welham Girls High School, on the occassion on their cultural activities. The Dance and Music programmes provided to be a real feast for the boys. Major productions have also become a regular feature in school. Last year. We had the grand spectacle 'Toad of Toad Hall' and this year a hindi major production 'Under Secretary' directed by Mrs Devendra. The administration has also equipped the Audio Visual Squad with sophisticated lighting equipment to furnish its requirements. The management has also sanctioned the budget for the purchase and development of sophisticated sound system. According to Mr. Raina (Head of Audio Visual Squad) the management has agreed and sanctioned the budget for the purchase and development of a suitable sound system. He also added that the school had turned its attention towards video because the government had nationalized all 16mm distributing agencies and that all the

16mm films which were available have been shown to the boys. Kapil Gupta, leader of the Audio Visual Squad comments. 'It started from scratch and now we are moving at a very fast pace. Our motto is to "Race the Wind". The school also arranged a slide show cum lecture by world famous butterfly expert Mr. Hutton on saturday the 11th May. It was our privilege also to have in our school Dr. Salim Ali the world renowned orinthologist.

Mr. Kandhari is also going ahead with his ambitious programe of installing solar heaters all over the school, and the circulation of strong rumours has hinted towards the introduction of computers by the end of the year. Reports have also confirmed the fact that the administration has refurnished the carpentry with new equipment.

Recently the Oliphant leart from some unimpeachable source that the sports department had been provided with one of the largest budgets. Apart from the admittance of new sports equipment, the school has done exceptionally well in sports. Under the able guidance of Mr. A. Singh and Mr. Chaturvedi the cricket and the hockey teams have played wonderfully. The Junior hockey team reached the peak of its success after winning the Inter-School Hockey Tournament.

Thus the machinery of the school is humming with activities as it is marching, branching and developing itself to every possible extent. We will be accused of looking at the school affairs with blind optism, but thats okay there, as there are plenty of others who report daily seeing pessimism. Our children returned to a spotlessly clean and tidy Woodseats at the end of winter vacation January 31, 1985. Its warm welcome made them happy and bright like a new day out of the morning sky. In no time they slid smoothly into a season of work, play

and recreation.

Almost a month's hard work at school earned a day's picnic in open countryside. On February 24th we packed off to Dak Patthar by bus. There arrived

we ate our lunch and rambled off to see the Yamuna River checked in its flow behind a big dam and crossed by a bridge on it. This was some experience. Some days later I took two off days. Puneet Singhal was quick to tell me that I had taken two day-offs and would not allow him even one.

Two picnics in a space of month between April-May is a treat to make life at Welham enjoyable and with a long break of summer holidays round the corner there is not one child who is home sick. It is our business to keep children in our care happy.
