

MID-TERM REPORT ON KALSI

It was dawn when we started. We were a group of eleven with Mr. Gusain as our escort. We had entered the foothills of Himalayas and it was a few kilometres ahead of Kalsi where the road had beed obstrucked by a land-slide.

We had to go across the landslide on foot and

that get on to another bus. The bus was jam-packed. As a consequence we found ourselves travelling on the roof. We reached Chakrata at about 1.30 p.m.

After lunch we begun our trek without heavy rucksacks on our back. We were to trek from Chakrata to Alu Mandi. It was an easy trek and were in Alu

Mandi in twenty minutes.

There was a short halt at Alu Mandi and then we begun the tough path of our trek., ... We followed a trekking route which was surronded on both sides by a Forest of Deodar trees. We were tired out very soon as most of the trek was up-hill so we made a few stops. We finally made it to our destination panting and puffing. It had taken up two and a half hours. The time now was 5.30 p.m. The sun was setting and it had become quite cool. It was very quiet around. We looked around for some people. Finding not a single soul in the vicinity. We decided to find ourself shelter before it became dark. It took us no time in locating a Forest Rest House which was at a point higher than the rest of the houses. We all raced there anxious to rest. But on reaching there we found a big Lock hanging on the door. We somehow managed to get it through a broken window. It was a beautiful but old rest house. There was everything we reached there except water and unfortunately we had also finished the water, we were carring. Luckily we found half bucket of water which we boiled. We then drank the water and ate some buns we had got with us. It took us no time in falling asleep and by 8 pm. we were all fast asleep.

Next morning at 5.00 a.m. we were shaken out of our Slumber by Mr. Gusain. He suggested that we would all get up and change as fast as we could as we had to plan out the next part of our trek.

The next part of our trek i. e. to Goraghati was all down hill so we all took it easy and in thirty minutes we reached a small hotel. We ate our breakfast and washed up at the hotel.

The trek continued on and on. It became very hot making out trek more and more tough. At some places the path was very slippery and at some places the path became very narrow. It became very difficult for us at these places.

By 1.30 p.m. we were in village called Banyana. As no food was available there we decided to look our Magi noodles. We got the utencils from the villagers. The villagers were very shy people but extremely helpful to us.

Under the heat of the sun without rucksacks on our back we carried on the trek to Goraghati. All went on smooth but then we took a target route as we had lost our way. We kept on trekking in the mountains on small narrow paths until dusk. Then finally we spotted a metal road. We quickly descended and touched the road. The trek to Goraghati was now only 4 Km and we made it in the no time we got no food at Goraghati also. Our hopes for a good-night sleep dashed to the ground when we were given a small room in which we all had to squeeze in.

However the night passed and after breakfast next morning we re-commenced our trek to Lakhamandal 16 Km away from Goraghati. The trek was easy as it was all down-hill and we made it to Lakhamandal in zups. Lakhamandal was a beautiful village surrounded by greenry. Down below the village flows the river Yamuna. In the centre of the village stands an ancient temple which is said to have been built by the Five pandavas. Near the temple is a Museum in which there are beautiful relics. Unfortunately we got no food here also and so we had to carry on from there to a place 4 Km away called Banigarh. We crossed the river Yamuna by a small trolley. It took us an hour and a half over here as we had to pull the trolley by ourselves. By 6 30 p m. we were in Barnigarh We found ourselves a Forest Rest House in which we kept our sacks. Right next to the rest house we found a small hotel in which we are our food. We spend the night comfortably and satisfied with ourselves.

The next morning we took a bus to Mussoorie and we spend the rest of the day there. We found ourselves a small and cheap rest house in which we spent the night,

The next morning we left Mussoorie for Dehra Dun (trekking). The Route was very familiar as we had done it before. We reached Rajpur at 5 pm. and we took a bus to Dehra Dun city from there. Tired and worn out we trekked back to school

Thus ended another five day experience which has been committed to our memory banks.

KOTDWAR TO LANSDOWNE

I won't bore the readers by going on and on about how we embarked on the plan nor how we prepared for the hike. Neither will I relate the initial stages of the trip, which means I shall begin from Kotdwar.

The stay at the farm house at Kotdwar was made all the more enjoyable by Mr. Sharma's hospitable efforts to make it so (Horse riding and so on) In the evening Mr. Sharma our host took the whole group on a hunting expedition making the best use of a tractor with a trailor tailing along, we scanned the entire farm with a search light in the some what fuitle hope of marking an animal-we did see a few partidges however.

The sun rose early the next morning, or so it seemed and after devouring puris with aaloo we began with the trek.

Each of us was equipped with a sleeping bag and a rucksack loaded with change we got to Bali bridge over the khop river and rested for quite sometime on the West bank. On the contrary I daresay we rested. All of us were busy either trying to get into the river or pushing someone else in!

The road to Dogadda, our destination that afternoon, was a flat one - not very dangerous and a gentle gradient It ran along the river-scour and wasn't frequented by H.T.V.S. We were walking along it when disaster struck. Miss Yadav wanted to know who had her sleeping bag; she got no reply! In a split second Piyush and Parag were seen running in the opposite direction. The rest could only wait in contemplation as to how had it been left behind, half anticipating the two to return without it. It was found and in another

three hours or so we reached Dogadda.

After spending the night in Dogadda, the hiking group took off for Lansdowne which is 27 Km. from Dogadda. The trekking foot track turned from the bridge at Fathepur Pauri (not Sikri, mind you) rather steep so I thought with the river dis-appearing in the distance as we climbed higher and higher into the mountains. We had to climb from a height of 680 metres to 1749 metres above sea level (the elevation of Landsdowne). The Horizontal quivalent was about 20 Km. making the effective average gradient 0 0063. We used sweets to quench our thirst Thick bushes were to be found in plenty along with chestnut and Deodar trees in the initial stages of the trek,

Not much water was available we surived till a village on the way where we replenished our canterns and our bodies with water. I noticed that the stones around the hill had a strikingly high content of Mica As we climbed higher and began to get somewhere near Lansdowne the rock forms turned into lime stone and marble (Amazingly) giving the land a whitish effect. The pack track has pieces of chipped rock strewn all over from which we inferred that the track wasn't very well frequented by man. We made it to landsdowne Height 5730

feet above sea level eventually with energy enough to trudge our weary way to the rest house.

Lansdowne-it was in this strikingly well maintained, clean and beautiful town that we spent the next day. Tiffin top a point from where many major peaks could be seen Nanda Devi and so on, is worth visiting the army officials were hospitable enough to show us around their mess, which had innumerable trophies, captured II w.w. weapons and other antiques.

We made our way back, the next day. The hikes were simply great experiences we had various locals asking us where we were from and even malaproping fellows Are you hitch hiking from Dehradun? "amusing. The camp fires we made are unforgettable we learnt quite a bit; making a conical wood structure and getting it to light happens only in movies and burning wood-wool only produces smoke. I guess we also learnt things like collective responsibility and the other stuff in one of those pamphlets on the DOESS expeditions objectives one last bit of advice-ensure that your rucksack has a waist belt the next time you go hiking or else in the words of miss Yadav You'll have it on the way'. This is not baloney mind you, neither is it prevailing if thats whats on your mind.

- पी**० ए**म० म्राप यहाँ के म्राध्यापक-गर्गा के बारे मैं क्या धारगाएँ रखते हैं ?
- श्री प्रसाद यहाँ का श्रध्यापक-गए। काफी तजुर्बेकार हैं, बहुत अच्छा है। उन्होंने मेरी बहुत मदद की श्रौर उनका. स्वभाव भी कोफी दोस्ताना रहा है। सच्चाई तो यह है कि ऐसे श्रध्यापक-गए। के साथ काम करने में मुभे बहुत मजा श्राता है।

हर संगठन में ऐसे समय ग्राते हैं जब कि कुछ गलतफहिमयाँ पैदा हो जाती हैं। लेकिन मैं यह कहते हुए खुशी महसूस करता हूँ कि ग्रव सारा तनाव समाप्त हो गया है।

श्री प्रसाद-जैसा कि काफी सारों को पता है मैंने एक पुस्तक लिखी है जिसका नाम है 'रिफलेक्शन्स'। यह पुस्तक जीवन ग्रीर जीवन जोने के ढंग के बारे में है। यह पुस्तक अभी लगभग महीने भर में ही छप कर तैयार हो रही है।

पी०एम०-कृपया अपने भविष्य के इरादे हमें बताइये। श्री प्रसाद-मैं तो तव तक वेल्हमस् में रहूंगा जब तक यह

स्कूल ऐसा चाहेगा। मुक्ते यह स्कूल बेहद पसन्द

पी०एप०- ग्रापका कोई खास शौक है ?

श्री प्रसाद- किताबें पढ़ना मेरा शौक है। किताबें पढ़ने के ग्रलवा मैं बैडिमिन्टन खेलना भी बहुत पसन्द करता हू।

पी०एम०-किताबों से सम्बन्धित एक प्रश्न याद ग्राया । ग्राप हमारे पुस्तकालय के बारे में क्या सोचते हैं। क्या वह पर्याप्त है।

श्री प्रसाद- धन्यवाद।

प्रत्येक मनुष्य को किसी न किसी व्यवसाय, रोजगार, धन्धे प्रथवा पेशे की ग्रावश्यकता होती है। मनुष्य
जीवन का साकल्य इस बात पर ग्राधारित है कि मनुष्य
बुद्धिमता से ग्रपने गुणों ग्रोर योग्यताग्रों के ग्रनुकूल व्यवसाय को चुने। हजारों में शायद ही एक मनुष्य हो जिसे
गुजारे के लिए उद्योग करने की ग्रावश्यकता न हो। जीवन
को सुखी बनाने ग्रोर ग्रालस्य से बचाने के लिए काम सभी
के लिए ग्रावश्यक है।

कई लोग योग्यता होते हुए भी ज्यवसाय नहीं शक्त करते ग्रीर समय बरबाद करते हैं। समय का अपव्यय करना श्रात्महत्या के समान है। ससार से ऊबकर जीवन-मृक्त होने के लिए मानव श्रात्महत्या का साधन दूढता है। श्रात्महत्या उसे जीवन के संघर्षों से सदा-सदा के लिए मृक्त कर देनी है। ठीक उसी प्रकार समय का दुरुपयोग मानव-जीवन को निश्चित समय के लिए मृतप्राय कर देता है। समय की दुरुपयोगता मानव को कायर, पुरुषार्थहीन एवं श्रुनुद्योगी श्रीर श्रकमंण्य बना देती है। समय की दुरुपयोगता से केवल विचार ही दूषित नहीं होते, विलक मानव का नैतिक पतन हो जाता है।

आठ दिन बीत जाने पर वह व्यक्ति खाली हाथ बैठे-बैठे तंग आ गया। उसने पुनः ग्रपने मित्र को पत्र में लिखा-'भाई मैं तो मूखंता से यह समक्ष रहा था कि काम न करने में स्रानन्द है, परन्तु बात बिल्कुल उलटी है।" हाथ पर हाथ घर कर बैठाना मनुष्य के शरीर-धर्म के विरुद्ध है। मानव मन चक्की के समान है। जितना चक्की में गेहूं डालते जायेगा उतना उससे म्राटा निकलता जामेगा। यदि गेहूं नहीं डालोगे तो चक्की स्वयं को पीसने लगेगी।

ग्रालस्य देह-धर्म के विरुद्ध है। ग्रतएव हमें ग्रपने लिए काम चुन लेना चाहिए। यह कार्य हमारे मन, इच्छा कार्य शक्ति ग्रौर स्वभाव के ग्रनुकूल होना चाहिए। उसी से मनुष्य सफल हो सकता है।

ग्रसफलता के दो कराण होते हैं —स्वाभाविक कार्य-शक्ति के विरुद्ध व्यवसाय चुनना ग्रौर व्यवसाय कुशल हुए बिमा कार्य शरु कर देना इन दोनों को ध्यान में रख कर ग्रागे बढ़ना चाहिए।

भारत में ग्रसफलता का एक तीसरा कारण भी है।
यहाँ लोग मानसिक या मौखिक कार्य करना ही पसन्द करते हैं।
शारीरिक व्यवसायों को यहाँ घृणा योग्य समभा जाता है। शारीरिक
परिश्रम करने से लोगों को लाज्ज ग्राती है। कर्में न्ट्रियों को उपयोगी
कार्य में मन लगाने में लाज्ज कैसी।

सफलतो चाहने वाले मनुष्य का प्रथम कर्त्तं व्य यह देखना है। कि उसकी हची किन कार्यों की ग्रोर ग्रधिक हैं। यह बात गलत है कि हर कोई मनुष्य हर एक काम कर सकता है। लार्ड वेस्टरपील्ड स्वाभाविक प्रवृत्तियों के ज्ञान को ग्रनावश्यक समभते वे श्रोर केवल परिश्रम को ही सफलता का ग्राधार मानते थे। इसी सिद्धान्त के अनुसार उन्होंने ग्रपने लड़के स्टेनहाप को पुख्षार्थी बनाना चाहा। परन्तु उनका लड़का बड़ा होकर एक निकम्मा, ग्रालसी एवं रुचिहन प्रवृत्ति का युवक बन गया। बाद में लार्ड वेस्टरफील्ड ने ग्रपने लड़के को सुधारने का ग्रथक प्रयास प्रयास किया, परन्तु कोई लाभ न हुग्ना, उनका लड़का सुधर न सका बालक के बचपन के कामों को देखकर बताया जा सकता है कि वह किस प्रकार का मनुष्य होगा। छोटी ग्रायु में कविता करने वाला कवि, सेना बनाकर चलने वाला सेनापित, भुट्टे चुराने वाला चौर-डाकू, पुर्जे बनाने वाला मैकेनिक ग्रौर विज्ञान में रुचि रखने वाला वैज्ञानिक बनेगा।

जब यह विदित हो जाए कि लड़के की रुचि किस काम की ग्रोर है तब यह करना चाहिए कि उसे उसी विषय में ऊँची शिक्षा दिल।ई जानी चाहिए। ऊँची शिक्षा प्राप्त कर मनुष्य ग्रपने काम घन्छे में कम परिश्रम से भी ग्रिषिक सफल हो सकता है। जिनके काम घन्छे का पूर्ण प्रतिबिम्ब बचपन में नहीं दिखता वे ग्रपवाद ही है।

प्रत्येक मनुष्य में एक विशेष कार्य भ्रच्छी तरह करने

की शक्ति होती है। वह बड़ी इड़ श्रीर उत्कृष्ट होती है। वह देर तक नहीं छिपती । उसके श्रनुकूल ही व्यवसाय चुनने से सफलता मिलती है। जीवन में यदि श्रापने सही कार्य-क्षेत्र चुन लिया तो, समक्ष लीजिए कि बहुत बड़ा कार्य कर लिया।

The Footlights are Flashing again......

This play is not a copy of the Doon School Pageant It does not trace the life of a school child from A-Z. The production was planned before she had an idea that Doon was producing a similar show for their Founder's Day. Furthermore the theme and mood of the play is entirely different as claims M. S. Yadav. It reflects a curious mixture of the amusing aspects, the natural aspects and the aspects of pride that go into making Welhams, the school it is. It is the joy of being a Welhamite. Since this is entirely a creation, production, according to the directors, it is difficult to fit it into any kind of genre.
