



Tell me love is endless, don't be so pretentious
Leave me like you do"

Can you imagine writing lines like these at 16? These are one of the many soul-stirring lyrics written by Billie Eilish, a prominent pop-singer and songwriter. She is 18 now and has earned recognition that people associate with artists like Drake, Justin Bieber! She has over 64 million followers on Instagram and an enormous fanbase. ‘Bad guy’, the single from her album ‘When we all fall asleep, where do we go’, reached the top of all charts and saved her a seat at the crest. She is the youngest artist ever to win Grammy Awards in all four major categories. But what is it about the music that makes her gain so much attention and appreciation? If I had to describe her music in 3 words I would say that it is unique, edgy and soothing. Having a genre diversified album was certainly a plus one for fans as it ranged from genres such as trap music, electro-pop, indie pop and whatnot. I believe that to rule the music industry you should have something about your music that makes you stand out from the rest. Billie has that capability and she is already wearing the crown. Her music has changed the whole pop industry into something no one would expect. However, many people don’t know that she started her career by posting her single, ‘Ocean Eyes’ at the age of 14. A very important fact about her career is that her brother, Finneas O’Connell is the one that arranges and produces her songs till date. ‘Ocean Eyes’ became an overnight success and it’s not easy to deal with fame especially when you are dealing with depression at the same time, which Billie unfortunately was.

When Billie was young she wanted to become a world-known dancer but due

to some serious injuries, she lost her ability to dance and could no longer pursue that profession. Just after this depressing incident, her brother thought of including her in his song, ‘Ocean Eyes’ which synced flawlessly with her voice. This kicked off to the start of her career and she made collaborations with singers like Khalid and then released another song, ‘ Lovely’ which reached number 64 in the Billboard Top 100 and reached several countries. Billie says her music is affected by a disorder – Synesthesia (a neurological condition in which information meant to stimulate one of your senses stimulates several of your brains). She states that the visuals are just as important as the music. Looking at her album it is clearly visible that every single video of hers is uniquely shot and is beautifully formed in her own mind. She directs her own

videos and takes it all in just one shot which is a real talent. For example, the song “Bury a Friend” gives us a very dark feeling while “Xanny” on the other hand is quite a pastel and white. What stands out in her album are the different aesthetics in each video. For example, when I think of ‘You should see me in the crown’ I recall spiders, ‘All the good girls go to hell’ reminds me of fire and feathers and ‘bellyache’ paints my mind yellow. And this is the exact power of Billie’s album. It leaves a mark and conjures unique imagery with every song without blending into a monotone of teenage melancholy.

The lyrics in all of her songs are extraordinary, powerful, thoughtful and very poetic. The words in each song add a whole new meaning to it and the music arranged by her brother behind the scenes gives it perfect support.

Another very important reason as to why you should catch up to her music is because she is the future of pop and her style is a class apart when compared to other musicians. She hides her body in layers and layers of baggy clothes and defends it by saying this way the world will never judge her by her body but her music. Not to forget that Billie’s voice in her songs is magnificent, magical and unreal. Secondly, this album has 14 songs that have already topped all charts and won many awards. To conclude, this album is something you shouldn’t miss out on!

T.V. SERIES REVIEW DARK

"Yesterday, today and tomorrow are not consecutive, they are connected in a never-ending circle. Everything is connected."

What are your expectations of a time travel story? Movies often experiment with the concept of parallel universes and alternate timelines but take only a linear approach. When we factor in the idea that every character's actions, be it in the past or the present, influences the story in the future, the whole narrative changes. Dark executes this with near perfection and in my opinion, that is what makes it a revolutionary piece of art.

'Dark' is set in the German town of Winden, where a young boy named Mikkel vanishes, 33 years after the disappearance of his father's brother. This brings back to surface the troubling history of the town. We get to know about the relationship between four families and as we delve deeper into the show, intriguing secrets about each generation as well as unexpected connections reveal themselves. Soon the plot develops into an intricate puzzle, jumping from one timeline to the other and confusing the audience with unfathomable twists, something most people love it for.

Moreover, 'Dark' has a myriad of philosophical ideas within its storyline. For example, it made me realize that our perception of things is binary. We let our thoughts be based on dualism. Entrance, exit. Black, white. Good, evil. Everything appears as opposing pairs of the same concept when this is not so. Throughout the plot, there is no clear differentiation between good and evil because the show wanted to convey that everything is just a matter of perspective. It also touches upon the age-old riddle of killing baby Hitler and is able to blend



supernatural elements from productions like twin peaks, stranger things and back to the future - all into a fairly different plot. The showrunners have meticulously incorporated symbolism and ensured that it is clearly visible to viewers for example the significance of the number three which indicates the three eras - past, present and future. This is also the logic behind keeping the number of seasons limited to three. Beneath the mystery and obscurity, at the core of dark, lies the very simple message of how we never actually have free will. Dark's storyline is built around the characters trying to control events

in another timeline in the hope that it resolves their problems. Their actions, however, have no effect and they end up causing the same events which they were trying to prevent. A character at a point, comments- "We're not free in what we do, because we're not free in what we want." The story writers of 'Dark' have used this very idea to create a supernatural drama, which even Stephen King recommends as a must-watch (in a tweet). When it comes to filmmaking, the story itself cannot account for a good viewing experience. But the creators have ensured that every aspect is flawless. Be it the stellar cast or the adept background score, every element has been planned and placed in a manner that captivates the audience. Even rain plays a major role by complementing the suspenseful tone of the show. All in all, dark leaves little room for mistakes, a rare accomplishment nowadays making it a timeless series, quite literally.

I think the best way to describe 'Dark' is that it isn't a show you watch, it is rather a show you solve. While interacting with people, I often realized that they considered this series to be too cerebral or confusing. But my perception of it changed as soon as I started watching it. Solving this show is not as challenging as some people might consider it. In fact, just going with the flow will put things into perspective. All you have to do is watch with an open mind and enjoy as each big revelation (numerous by the way) changes your notion of what cinema and storytelling can achieve.






more. I believe that all of this is just a 'moneymaking competition' and the tech industry, in general, is pretty corrupt, both morally and financially.

New Game, New Rules

We often compare Esports to gaming. These are two entirely separate things. Esports requires a specific set of skills and training and is considered a professional sport which involves salaries and a specific pool of prize money. Gaming is regarded as more of a casual activity, primarily intended for enjoyment. Though esports is also entertainment, there is a lot of hard work and dedication that an e-sport athlete puts in to become a professional. An esports gamer practises and hones his skills for hours to perfect his movements. Esports is an entire industry and is growing exponentially. This means that the jobs surrounding esports are continuing to become much more plentiful, similar to the growth experienced by other professional sports. Being an esports athlete is a viable career in many cases. If you play a popular game and are good at it, you might just have shot at becoming an esports athlete.

Many people confuse a professional E-sport player with a content creator or a streamer. There are players like Ninja and Shroud, which have left the competitive scene completely to pursue content creation. On the other hand, there are players like Scout and Mortal, who dedicate much of their time to esports. I personally feel that being a content creator and being a professional player cannot go hand in hand. This is because the time and energy commitment needed in being an esports player is too great to engage in side activities like content creation.

The main thing before starting to play a game professionally is to decide when the game would die out. Take the Clash of Clans -- it was just about to thrive in the E-sport biz, but suddenly PUBG comes up and takes over the gaming community by storm. On the other hand, we also have games like- DOTA 2 and League of Legends and Counter-Strike: Global Offensive, which have been there in the competitive arena since the 2010s and are still being played professionally. More games will hopefully continue to gain popularity, and people from around the world will be able to build their careers in the esports industry. When talking about games, another thing to note is if the Tier-1 Organizations like Team Mid Solo (TSM), Fnatic and Cloud9 are showing interest in the game. This is because to make a game grow to a professional level, the interest of organizations and sponsors is a must.

Earnings is also one of the factors that a player must consider. You have to make sure that the money you are making out of playing professionally is consistent and good enough for you to survive in the e-sport arena.

However, when I talk about gaming in India, it is still at a very nascent stage. There aren't as many opportunities. We need to note that playing games is not the only segment of the industry; there is also a textile industry for gaming and separate management industry for gaming. Game production is a separate industry and GFX is an independent industry. Many people and companies are working on these things, but there isn't much if we talk about jobs and opportunities apart from playing games. One hit to the industry has been on PUBG-M by the Central Government. A lot of young, talented individuals had invested a lot of time and effort to reach new heights in the game, including tournaments held internationally. They represented India at a global platform through PUBG-M. What has actually really disturbed and irked me is the fact that there are so many people rejoicing at the ban. It reflects how little truly people understand, or even want to understand the world of gaming. We can still find an alternative but what about those who pursued this game professionally, spent loads of time, effort and resources into it?

Gaming is quickly evolving into a primary entertainment market, especially big multiplayer games like PUBG, CoD, Apex Legends. This whole idea of "it's just a game" doesn't apply to anyone who decides to go pro. It's like comparing gully cricket players to professional ones. Keeping this in mind, I think that it's going to be very risky if you want to pursue gaming full time and you don't have the knowledge and experience. Gaming should always be a secondary option because it takes a lot of time. You also have to ensure that you have a reliable backup, it can be in the form of a family business or your academics.




Socio-Political Activity In The Age of Instagram

It is not often that the beliefs and ideas of a citizenry can be redefined not by the direct effects of the conditions of status quo on the citizenry, but rather the means of spreading the beliefs. Equally unique is the observation that a medium for the spread of ideas can force conformity to pre-existing notions and pre-established conclusions onto its users which is essentially the exact opposite purpose such a medium is meant to serve. These observations have forced intellectuals and academics to take a closer look at the activism of any kind in this internet age. Broadly speaking,

That everyone is expected to be politically correct is indirect acceptance and even endorsement of the status quo and its corresponding zeitgeist. And the fact that the definition of political correctness varies through time and geography makes this particular characteristic even more vivid. The metaphor “little knowledge is dangerous” rings alarmingly true here, because those new to politics and internet culture at large are indoctrinated with politically correct and conformist beliefs and made to fit into the aforementioned false line of best fit. The scatterplot of ideological inclinations would ideally have to be, well, scattered, but the internet bubble puts it in a straightjacket to fit its own ‘politically correct’ standards.

The selective democratization of the internet and thus, ideology has also alienated real and concrete issues from public discourse and discussion. The class with a largely undisputed monopoly on the flow of information on the internet remains largely unaffected by real-world issues that continue to plague a large chunk of humanity. This creates a bubble of conjured and fabricated issues within the already existing bubble of privileged internet users. Rather than focusing on real-world economics and development, the internet finds it easier to divert attention to abstract issues that do not directly affect the masses. In effect, this alienates a hefty portion of the population from the primary venue of political discourse in the 21st century, i.e. the internet. And by distracting the public eye from issues that are directly affecting the lower classes, the internet snatches even political relevance from them. This further increases the rift between the haves and the have-nots and subjects them to a cycle of political irrelevance, but I digress. Even if we do not subject issues like these to a classic Marxian examination, the graveness of this problem cannot be overlooked. Moreover, the instrumentality and complicity of the internet in acting as the medium for this alienation cannot be mistaken. By providing an unfair edge to ingrained and entrenched ‘politically correct’ bubbles, it has only rubbed salt on deep wounds.

The last observation I have made concerning the internet and its effect on political activity at large would be censorship from the wrong side. Historically, censorship has been associated with conservatism and even authoritarianism. But the internet has again flipped consensus on this issue. Today, the voice of censors is as ‘liberal’ as it is conservative. Borrowing from the argument about political correctness, any mention of so-called politically incorrect terms in mass media or even on the internet has come to warrant mass backlash. Any truly liberal community will never tolerate censorship from any end of any spectrum. In the eyes of the true progressive, the outcry over the use of transphobic stereotypes in the yet-to-release Laxxmi Bomb was as unwarranted as the demand for censorship of certain scenes in the movie Padmaavat. While the origin and extent of both cases might be radically different, the goals of both campaigns can be thought of as being the same. Constraints on artistic expression should be considered intolerable in the kind of society the internet bubble seemingly aims to achieve. But, in practice, they have betrayed many such ideals. The internet of today is a symptom of false liberalism, in the sense that it is intolerant of views that are not characteristically liberal.

These observations make the internet different from any previous medium for the spread of ideas. Newspapers have historically been thought of as independent and accommodative to all ideological inclinations. News media has its fair share of ideological deviation from the assumed norm. It is only the internet that has normalised conformism, albeit of the ‘progressive’ kind.

Readers of this article may find it difficult to pinpoint its motive. The article is neither strictly ideological nor particularly conclusive. No 800-word piece of writing can claim to have done either of those things properly. This article is, however, a set of observations made with a largely elementary understanding of technologically and consequently the nitty-gritty of the internet and its associated algorithms. What I have aimed to do throughout its course is a superficial analysis of the impact of the internet on society and thus, politics.

It has been seven long months since this pandemic became a global crisis. The whole world has been in a state of turmoil since the month of March when the lockdown was first initiated. The amount of suffering that it has caused is unfathomable. Most of us are lucky enough to have been brought up in privileged families, protected from the suffering caused by the outbreak, but not everyone is as fortunate. As this becomes the new normal, it's time for us to help who are facing the brunt of this pandemic. The silver lining of this pandemic is it will let the ingenuity of the human spirit flourish as we try to find new solutions in these unprecedented times. Although our school has been doing its share of community outreach programs, the action of some has allowed us to ask ourselves; Is what the school has been doing enough? Moreover, are students realizing the importance of social service? I believe that it's time to step up the game.

Welham Boys' School is one of the most prestigious education institutions in India, with a diverse community from around the country. It is expected that our outreach programs will be one of the best too. The partnership between the Aasraa trust and our school has existed for a long time. They conduct the 'Each One Teach One' program at our school, in which the volunteer teachers from the Aasraa trust make use of our classrooms to give basic primary education to underprivileged children from around the neighbourhood and teach them basic etiquettes. These children are even provided with a cup of milk and bananas as refreshments. The students, however, are only responsible for bringing these refreshments from the Bethany (dining hall) to the academic block. The students must have a more active role in the running of the program. Until and unless there is no real interaction between the students and those children, there is no learning outcome for students. Students will never understand the importance of social service because they won't be aware of their capability to make a change. The aim of community outreach programs in schools should be to create a direct channel of communication between students and the underprivileged kids that will result in a mutually beneficial relationship. They learn from us and we learn from them. The volunteers from the trust could create a workshop to teach Welhamites how to conduct these classes, and allow for smaller class sizes so the underprivileged kids get more individual attention. This will also allow the students to have a more personal connection with the children they teach. 'Behtar India' -- the initiative launched by the media giant NDTV is the most prominent initiative that our school took under its outreach program. Although it was well planned to promote a sense of duty in students and give back to society, it had one major flaw. There wasn't any continuity in it. Social work is something that needs to happen on a regular basis, otherwise, there is no lasting impact on society. Teacher Speaks

High school is a great time to try things that you haven't done before – including volunteering. And, community service is an area of learning where you can volunteer, meaning that you choose to help out because you want to do so. There are numerous reasons why you should volunteer for it. Community service can have a lot of positive effects on students, such as helping them to develop skills, making contacts and allowing them to improve the quality of life of others'.

Students may think it's not worth their time to get involved in the community because it isn't glamorous work, isn't 'cool', requires too much patience and doesn't give instant results. However, there are several benefits that volunteering can give you that no other work can.

Many schools make it mandatory to put in 150-200 hours of community service before they're willing to grant a certificate. Many other schools require service learning. This term describes an approach to education that aims to connect lessons learned in the classroom with real-life lessons learned through community service. It is a practice that allows students to learn more about their personal motivations, practice academic material outside of the context of the classroom and testing, develop critical thinking skills while solving real-world problems and to think about problems and social issues in new ways.

This kind of experiential learning or applying what you have learned in the classroom to the real world has a lot of positive benefits for students apart from meeting a requirement to graduate. These include a better understanding of the value of teamwork, decision-making skills, development of leadership abilities and the gain of practical skills. Additionally, you would be gaining a new perspective on your community and on what life is like for a group of people that is often overlooked: the terminally ill. This could change how you see the world and your role in it. For example, students may learn that they have excellent skills in coping with a crisis or other stressful situations, or may learn that they find taking charge of a team to be a struggle. This kind of exposure to different situations can then teach students how to further develop skills that they have and how to work on areas they struggle in. In particular, students find that they are able to develop skills in leadership, communication, working well within a team and finding solutions for problems.

Many students also find that community service makes them more aware of and interested in issues of social justice. For example, if you spend your days going to school, playing sports and doing homework, in all likelihood you will not spend a lot of time thinking about the problems that homeless people encounter such as prejudice, poverty, returning to work or earning a self-supporting living.

Once people learn more about struggles and injustices that other groups of people face, they are statistically more likely to want to actively take part in making a change in the policies and social structures that keep certain groups from succeeding.

Numerous studies over the past several years have shown that volunteering isn't just good for your mind and conscience; it's also good for your body. By focusing on others' problems instead of their own, students have reported reduced stress and overall improvement in mood and health.

Volunteering can also help protect people from depression during challenging times like the pandemic as it tends to help create a strong support system. Volunteers are physically healthy because they keep active. Certain activities, such as working to clean up a park or a slum can be a good exercise. Studies have shown that especially as people get older, volunteering in these kinds of projects can keep people healthy and can even lessen the symptoms of certain diseases.

Of course, not all the benefits of volunteering are limited to the volunteer. Another big way that people benefit is in their involvement with their community. Networking is another major benefit of volunteering. As a volunteer,

you will be very likely to meet like-minded individuals who share your interests. In future, these people can be important contacts for writing letters of recommendation and for putting you in touch with the right people for scholarships and jobs.

However, don't volunteer just because you think it looks better. Especially for college applications, admissions officers prefer to see a local long-term volunteer commitment than something that has only lasted a week or two during a summer break.

Finding a cause that you are passionate about is the key. If you have always had an affinity for animals, try working at a shelter or a charity working on animal rights. The more you care about the cause, the more dedicated you will be to continue working for it over a long period of time.

Yet still, you can't eclipse the other side. By this I mean remembering those painstaking days when you began to realise that you cannot change the world over night, where you questioned whether your efforts actually made any difference. Occasionally slipping back into that ongoing cycle of confronting your conscience... I mean who gives us the right to decide what is best for another person, culture or their way of living, and so on. Personally, I would say, don't be afraid of making a change. Ask questions when something doesn't seem right. If you end up doing work that doesn't seem like a good fit, is causing excessive stress or if the experience isn't allowing you to do the things you thought you would be working on, it's ok to leave to find something else. To write this article I opened the CAS (Creativity, Action and Service) journals from my days as a CAS Coordinator for an IB programme a decade or so ago. Every chance to open those journals recharges me and makes me even more determined to continue with my volunteering work, and talk about this with you. Let's go back to the question of how we are doing at social service. Well! I leave you to answer that question now. All I have to say is that even if we have taken a few baby steps in this direction, we are on our way and will be arriving soon but have definitely not arrived, yet. I hope that settles it then.
