pierced my foot. I was hurt and fell. I lost in a jiffy.




all these people I only have one message ' Anyone can sit and criticize but not everyone can perform and counter that unjust criticism.'

CLASS 8 LEADERSHIP CAMPS



People don't get to choose their gender ergo they shouldn't be discriminated against or favored on the basis of something which they didn't choose to be. If women have the same rights and opportunities as men, their mental horizons expand. As an equal partner in a family system, women will be able to make decisions and provide for their family just like the men. These skills and

ethics can then be passed on to the children - both girls and boys - leading to further growth of society.

Discrimination on the basis of gender has widely been the case with women and is especially the case in India where people have only recently realized that women deserve equal opportunities as men, but there still are conservative societies who won't provide education to the girl child. Girls who might be skilled at some work are often misguided by the society and its views,

and here valuable talent is wasted. For example -The society believes that playing games is just for fun and one shouldn't try to make a career out of it. Now, a girl who has a real passion for gaming wants to pursue gaming as a career but is abstained by her parents because they believe that there is no scope in gaming and their thoughts are based on the stigma that an ideal family is one where women do not go to work. They stay at home, look after the children and devote the rest of their time to the husband when he comes home from his 9 to 5 job. They believe that a girl's talents are of no use after marriage and hence try to curb all interests and try to shift her focus to household work. This is just a small example explaining a small issue in this big world.

Something that usually doesn't get the limelight when talking of gender equality is the third gender. Eunuchs are not given employment and they have strived really hard to get acceptance in society. People of different societies don't realize that even they have their fair part to play in shaping the general people's thoughts. 




