The first racing game that I played was tons of fun — beating the opponents with baseball bats and chains and kicking them out of the road. The world evolved and moved on from Road Rash to Gran Turismo and Need for Speed. Then came along Forza Motorsport and showed the world what racing games are supposed to be like. Unfortunately, this game has not received the attention it deserves in India because...well... "Play-Station loyalists" and also because Microsoft would not give this invaluable franchise away just like that.

Forza 5 is the combination of the pleasure of racing and the beauty of exotic cars. 


makes that hard right on the Nürburgring.

Take the most brutal mass murder in history and cross it with a graphic novel. The result - MAUS. MAUS is the Pulitzer prize winning graphic novel about the life of Vladek Spiegelman (Art's father) who was a survivor of the Holocaust.

MAUS talks of how it started with Jews being differentiated and all the favors that Vladek had to pull later on as things started to get iniquitous. It has the elements friendship, love, betrayal and lots of jaw-dropping moments that actually happened over 60 years ago. (It is still not a movie though)

I loved the way the author has drawn the panels as the story shifts gracefully between the author's turbulent personal life in the present, and his father's traumatic life during the Nazi rule. The concept of races is highlighted elegantly by showing different races as animals - Jews as mice, Germans as

cats, Polish as pigs and Americans as dogs.

The exceptional story-like way in which the Holocaust has been explained is truly remarkable. At some points the book reads like a normal book but the interruptions by the author's personal life (like the fame he received after writing the first of the two MAUS books) suck you back into reality and leave you pondering over a hailstorm of questions.

Art Spiegelman has made a masterpiece of a book. MAUS is enjoyable, surprising and intimidating, all at same time. Nevertheless, it is a page turner and a must read for everyone, especially you historians and conspiracy theorists out there.

“When I was alone, I was petrified.” As the credits roll, Gloria Gaynor’s voice pierces through the air singing the 80s hit ‘I will survive’; its ironic to say at the very last, because much of the movie is based on similar theme and the first lines of the song manage to capture the emotions that astronaut Mark Watney feels knowing that he is trapped on Mars and that the source of help is just 140 million miles away.

“The Martian” directed by Ridley Scott starring Matt Damon is refreshing film that seeks to understand the endeavor of the human spirit to survive even in the hardest conditions. The movie opens with the crew of Ares 3 collecting mineral samples on Mars when a storm suddenly hits and one of its members, Dr. Mark Watney is separated from the crew. The crew decides to go back to

earth, thinking Mark is dead and our hero is stranded on the red planet with a piece of satellite sticking out of him and enough resources to survive for about a month.

Being another space movie directed by an acclaimed director with a star studded cast, one can’t help but try to compare ‘The Martian’ with space films such as ‘Interstellar’ and ‘Gravity’. However the comparison would be inappropriate because though the setting is similar, the concept and the major themes that surround the movie and the way it is portrayed are drastically different. While both ‘Gravity’ and ‘Interstellar’ are space drama movies of a serious kind, ‘The Martian’ is more comical. It seems to mine out the hinges from the cheeky bone one-liners the lead actor constantly delivers while trying to survive both physically and from boredom. Scenes in which Dr. Mark Watney delivers these witty one-liners, such as those with NASA and when he grows potatoes from his very own feces are some of the best in the movie.


Though light-hearted, there are scenes which genuinely manage to well up

tears, especially those when the astronomers speak to their families or when Dr. Mark Watney lies alone gazing at the stars. Behind all the humor and the wit that is portrayed by the director, there is however felt a sense of loneliness knowing that he might as well never his family or friends again, and it from his loneliness that the humor appears as he tries to brush real feeling aside with a good laugh.

Filled with picture perfect moments and amazing visuals, ‘The Martian’ manages to entertain its audience for all the 2 hours and 10 minutes of its running time. Matt Damon is in top form and is well supported by all the other actors who are also a part of this film. Through its light-hearted feel and comic spirit ‘The Martian’ brings out a unique picture of a man trying to survive which will stay with you days after you leave the movie hall. It is befitting that this spectacle of human stirring and endeavor ends with Gloria Gaynor’s ‘I will survive’

Pharmacy is the debut studio album by the Swedish electronic music duo Galantis, released on 8 June, 2015. Over the past couple of years this Swedish progressive house duo, Galantis has made a considerable mark in the EDM world. With Pharmacy they have fulfilled the high expectations that they had set after the 2014 release. This album is a wild and twisting ride through big room hallmarks, driving bass and soaring synth.

The album is finally out and is making EDM fans crazy with its amazing tracks. Filled with pop masterpieces, this album is very likely to be etched in the collective memory of anyone who listens to it. The first song, 'Forever Tonight' is a riskless upbeat, full of house leads that build up to trance synth stacks accompanied with euphoric female voices. 'Gold Dust sets the bar higher with powerful lyrics and a

moving melody. 'Runaway', 'You' and 'Smile' are also very memorable tracks. The rest of the tracks are also melodic and different from the usual EDM tracks that we are used to listening. This is the reason why it had been on top of The Billboard Electronic Album list.

Although this album is nothing like the usual EDM albums but somewhere, the tracks show a similarity. None of them are poorly done but some of their debut effort display sound similarity. You must have seen lizards roaming about while you are trying to hit them. You are lucky that their big bad ancestors can't come to their rescue. Who are these? Yes, the now fossilized, previous dominators of the earth – Dinosaurs. Let's go back in the time and know more about them.


I thank Ma'am Bindra for giving me the freedom and the liberty to run the 'Learning Differently Center.' It has been a pleasure to work under her guidance.

At Welham, I have made some very good friends. They are my lifelines. I would have been incomplete without their support. It's difficult to name all of them.



Next morning immediately after our breakfast and collecting our refreshments, we started for Hemkund




