It has been an eventful year and I am extremely pleased to break up the sequence of Events that have unfolded which have helped in achieving a remarkable all around progress for our society.


Starting with the - The 80th Founder's Day Dinner, 2017

Executive Committee and WOBS Secretariat





a simple answer for these questions - Believe in what your heart says and remember that you will feel complete when you have discovered what you feel passionate towards and magic and miracles will happen.





On a ship cruise like this, one is treated like royalty. I had muffins and cookies delivered to my room by the porter every day. We also got a welcome gift - a lovely men's cologne, a great lavender and vanilla smell that I enjoyed wearing when I went for supper. I used to roam around the ship in my blue denim, black t-shirt and flip flops as casual as ever. I would wake up late at times and miss a few dockings and expeditions to the islands but that was cool as I was in no hurry. As it is, I could get the view of the great Antarctic Peninsula from the balcony of my room where I had put my camera on a stand. I would shoot pictures from here all the while. At times, there would be an announcement from the captain's deck when any whale has been sighted. We would all rush to the top deck to take a view from the grand terrace pool on top.







But, it was the wildlife of Antarctica which was the most majestic with Weddell Seals, Antarctic Penguins, Elephant Seals and Fur Seals. These seals are blobby little things and most of the time, it feels as if they are trapped in their own body. They are very poor on land and have to almost drag themselves inch by inch to move on the ground. They feel restricted and helpless on the shore but in water, they move like magic. Their thick rubber-like blubber gives them a lot of protection from the icy temperatures of the region. They love to eat fish as a meal to survive. The Weddell Seal was discovered by James Weddell in 1820. It grows a brown and dark fur around its skin as it grows to protect it from the cold climate of the region.

I saw many of them. Some were just lying

on the pebbled earth on the seashores. Some were almost snoozing on top of thick masses of ice. They would move a bit or open their eyes to give us a pose for the camera. Then like snails, they would try to wriggle past us with not much progress as they are hopeless on solid ice or land.

I also spotted the famous Tuxedo Penguin who had black lines marking their necks which looked like a bow tie in a black tuxedo. A huge colony of Antarctic Penguins dances around the land mass of Antarctica making funny noises and flapping their wings. We were asked to keep our distance and take photos from afar so as to not scare these gentle creatures. It's as if nature had made these creatures just for this great continent. Their entire notary was suited to the icy

cold terrains of this region. Most of these animals feasted on krill, prawns and sea fish to survive and give them the required energy

The panoramic view of the slates of ice floating on the ocean bed was another sight to behold as our ship motored through cutting the thick plates of ice and sending them to the sides. This was the only way to cruise forward. Vast regions of the ocean were covered by slates of ice like granite floating on the surface of ocean water.




Set your pulse racing and adrenaline pumping while exploring regions and soaking in views you had only seen on postcards. Let the adventurer in you go take a hike!

TREKS TO ADD TO YOUR BUCKETLIST

Like a lot of life's best experiences, you don't realise what you're missing out on unless you've trekked once. And then, it's almost like tasting blood (quite literally sometimes, when the going gets tough!), you'll only want more! The world-with its high mountains, rugged terrains, uncombed forests and gushing waterbodies-becomes your playground, and you want to explore every inch of it, scale greater heights! As we begin the process of initiating you into the world of excursions, here are some of the trekking destinations you should consider in 2018.





ATTEMPT A 6000M PEAK, LADAKH

When it comes to trekking, the best part about the Indian Himalayas is that there is something for everyone! From easy and moderate to technical climbs, the range gives you enough scope to gradually build your experience and intentsity. We suggest you begin your escapade from Ladakh. The region has the highest concentration of 6000m plus peaks in the world! While most of them are isolated, bordering Tibet, and are advance climbs, there are a few that are accessible and can be attempted by people with somebasic camping and trekking experience. Of these peaks, Stok Kangri (6150m) is the most popular! It is one of the highest walking peaks in the country, offering a fun climb that also tests your stamina, fitness and mental fortitude. You can also attempt GolepKangri (5900m) from the same base camp. If looking for more semitechnical climbs, opt for MentokKangri II, overlooking the stunning Tso Moriri (6210m) and Kang Yatse II (6250m) in the Markha Valley. Do make sure you undertake all these climbs with experienced guides and, proper gear, complete

with crampons and ice axes.

Duration Time10-14 days Mid July to September

Sometimes you may even be roped together depending upon the weather conditions. These climbs can be challenging in parts, pushing your physically as well as mentally, but trust us, once you reach the summit, there is no better feeling!

Mid July to September

While at Ladakh, this is another trek we swear by, and everyone must try at least once! Ladakh is well-known for its cold arid desert landscape, but

what if we told you it has sand dunes as well? Yes, Nubra Valley, nestled on the banks of Shyok River, is home to some magnificent silver sand dunes



and Bactrian camels! But instead of going there by road, we suggest you trek to Nubra from Leh. This voyage, starting at Phyang, will take you to the high pass of Lasermo La (5400m), offering unmatched views of the snow-capped Karakoram range, ending with a walk through the sand dunes. A phenomenal experience! You can also visit monasteries in Phyang, Hundar and Diskit on the way. Do keep in mind that it is a tiring trek, and you will need to get acclimatised to the thin air of Ladakh. But nothing that determination, preparation and some 'getting used to' can't conquer.



EVEREST BASE CAMP, NEPAL

Duration14 days

TimeMarch to April,
September to November

Embark on the same epic journey that Sir Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay had set off on in 1953 to trek to the most famous base camp on the planet! In this 14-day excursion, not only will you get to experience some astounding mountain views, but will also catch fascinating glimpses into the lives of the famous Sherpas, enter the Sagarmatha National Park: a world heritage site, and tour some breathtaking high-altitude Buddhist monasteries. The adventure also includes climbing Kala Patthar (5643m), to admire the panoramic views of the mighty Everest, along with other majestic mountain offerings such as Nuptse, Changtse and the peak of Lhotse. Few things in life (if at all) compare to the thrill and the sense of accomplishment that grips you on seeing the tallest



mountain in the world so up close! But don't let the proximity daunt you: the itinerary is designed for even new trekkers who are in good health with average physical fitness. The ample distance covered between daily itineraries, steady gain of altitude and separate rest days ensure that one gets properly acclimatised to fully enjoy the trek.

Duration

10-11 days

March to April, October to November

GOECHA LA, SIKKIM

From one majestic peak to another! Kangchenjunga, at 8586m is the third-highest mountain in the world, and the Goecha La trek provides the perfect trail to pay homage to it! This moderate climb starts from Yuksom in North Sikkim, with small lodges for travellers peppered at the



campsites. On the way, Dzongri offers some great views of the Singalila range, Mt Pandim, Mt Japuno and Goecha La peak. Requiring to walk through rhododendron, pine and magnolia forests in the first days of the treks, the trail to Kangchenjunga is also a treat for bird watchers, with thrushes, cuckoos, blood pheasant, monal pheasant and other feathery friends hovering about in abundance. If lucky, you might also spot a yellow fronted marten! Revered by the people of Sikkim, climbers are not allowed to go all the way to the top and have to stop about 10m short of the summit of the mountain. But the sights are still as mesmerizing, and the feeling almost indescribable! Catching Kangchenjunga bathed in golden sunlight during the early morning sojourn to viewpoint 1 on the Goecha La pass is something that will remain with you forever!



DZUKOU VALLEY AND MT JAPFU, NAGALAND

Duration 5 days

Time

Throughout the year (but heavy rainfall during monsoon can make it slippery)

This is not just one trek but a destination! Nagaland, one of the eastern most states in India, borders Burma and is home to 16 different major tribes which are further divided into sub tribes. Each tribe is unique in its character, culture, food and customs, making this a cradle of colour and festivities. Head out to Dzukou Valley, covered with bamboo stalks, to camp for a couple of nights. Catch a stunning sunset here and wake up early to witness ice crystals frozen on bamboo leaves! We would suggest to trek up Dzukou from Viswema village, 20 kms from Kohima and climb back down via the Jakhama route. If you crave even more adventure, go climb Mt Japfu, the highest peak here at 3048m,



overlooking Kohima. A rugged, steep trek through rainforest, and a little bit of rock climbing just before the summit: this will test your endurance and quench your thirst for adventure all the same time!

Duration 10- 11 days

Time

March to April, October to November

GREAT LAKES, KASHMIR



One of the most scenic treks in India, this one is a fantastic walk in the meadows in Kashmir, and also the most easily doable! Allowing you experience five amazing high-altitude lakes, the trek starts from Sonamarg and ends in Narnag, with Gadsar Pass (4200m) as the highest altitude that you will be walking to. The trek promises fantastic views of Gadsar and Satsar lakes with The twin Gangabal lakes, nestled in the foothills of Mount Harmukh, being the highlight of the trek! These oligotrophic lakes are home to a variety of species of fish, including the brown trout. You will be required to carry your ID. With high mountains, deep valleys, numerous lakes, snow clad mountain peaks, thick forests and sparkling rivers, this is a must-try for every adventurer!



Mr Surindar "Çharlie" Kandhari was fondly known as the 2nd Founder of Welham Boys' School.

He was the longest serving Principal of the school for 18 long years (1st December,1982 to 20th May, 2001) since Miss Oliphant, who was there for 25 years.

He was also a student of the school (WPS), from 1st February, 1943 to 18th December, 1946 and went on to complete his schooling from The Doon School.

Incidentally, he was also the longest serving WOBS President for 9 years from 1984 to 1993.
